In a Nov. 1 press release, the Indiana Family and Social Services Administration's Division of Mental Health and Addiction announced the Believe in You campaign to support Hoosier youth. # scholarship and facilitator opportunities



The Research Institute for Public Libraries has announced its national event will take place on July 23-26, 2023 in Madison, Wisconsin.

Up to \$16,000 in scholarships is available to participate in the event, funded by the Embedding Evaluation in Libraries: Developing Internal Evaluators initiative through its Institute of Museum and Library Services grant. This scholarship opportunity is open to staff working in small and rural public libraries in the United States and public library staff and LIS students in U.S. programs who identify as American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, Black or African American, Hispanic or Latino, Middle Eastern or North African, and/or Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander. Additionally, up to 12 people will be selected to serve as facilitators at the event. Both RIPL alumni and those who are new to the event are welcome to apply. Facilitators will receive a discount on the registration fee. Learn more about this opportunity here. The application deadline is Nov. 19.

RIPL is an immersive, bootcampstyle event for public library staff and others interested in public library data and evaluation to learn practical, strategic methods of gathering, analyzing and using data for planning, management and communicating impact.

The American Library Association invites applications from small and rural libraries for the Libraries Transforming Communities:
Accessible Small and Rural Communities grant. The grant will offer more than \$7 million in funds to small and rural libraries to increase the accessibility of facilities, services, and programs to better serve people with disabilities.

Library workers may apply online for grant funding until Feb. 28, 2023. Up to 300 libraries will be awarded in this application period, part of ALA's longtime community engagement initiative.

Chosen libraries will first conduct community input-gathering sessions to assure that their work aligns with local needs. Libraries will be required to identify the primary audience they are hoping to reach and facilitate a community conversation with the impacted populations to guide improvement of the library's services. Grantees will then use the grant funds to create services or improve their facilities based on the needs identified by their audience.

Selected libraries will receive \$10,000 or \$20,000 to support costs related to their community engagement project; virtual training to assist project directors in developing their community engagement, facilitation and disability service skills; a suite of online resources developed to support local programs; and technical and project support from the ALA Public Programs Office throughout the grant term.

The opportunity is open to libraries serving small and rural communities in the U.S. and U.S. territories. To be eligible, a library must be located in an area that's more than, or equal to, five miles from an urbanized area and with a population of 25,000 or less, in keeping with Institute of Museum and Library Services definitions of small and rural libraries.
