

In 1863, recruitment of runaways at odds with the Emancipation Proclamation



160 years ago, Indiana was embroiled in the Civil War and the **Emancipation Proclamation** declared freedom for Confederate slaves. It also announced that African Americans could enlist in the army, but it exempted border states like Kentucky from complying. Indiana towns across the river from Kentucky were sympathetic to slaveholders there, as both sides benefitted from business operating through Louisville ports. In riverside towns like New Albany, mobs formed on both sides of the issue, some protecting runaway slaves and some driving them out.

Most Union officers in Kentucky upheld the border exception and refused to enlist African Americans, but slaves from Kentucky found sympathetic Union recruiters to sign them up and load them onto <u>project</u>

Leadership Johnson County's Third Annual Women's Retreat -Dare To Dream will be held Sept. 28-29 at Compass Park in Franklin. The retreat will begin both mornings at 8:30 a.m. with breakfast and networking, followed by the program at 9 a.m. The retreat will adjourn on Thursday at 4:30 p.m. and on Friday at 12 noon.

This year, the retreat will feature:

- DreamStorming to unleash imagination, learning techniques to tap into creative potential and exploring new possibilities.

Identifying one's values and how they link to and support dreams.
Mind mapping to organize and connect ideas in a structured and creative way. Attendees will be able to visually represent their ideas in a non-linear and interconnected manner, stimulating both the steamboats bound for Union camps. Such was the case on Saturday, Jan. 31, 1863, according to the <u>Madison</u> <u>Evening Courier</u>. The story underlined the volatility of the situation and the determination of the runaways.

The Feb. 4, 1863 issue reported that, "One gentleman, from Garrard county, Kentucky ... recognized his slave on board in uniform (and) ... presented an order for him to the officer in charge, who refused to let him go on the boat. The officer called to the negro to know if he would go with his master. In reply the negro drew his pistol threatening to shoot."

Support for the proclamation went both ways. In a similar case that day, "the Captain of that boat refused to take any negroes, saying such were his orders. The officer in command ... insisted on the negroes remaining, when the Captain, and ... the entire crew, left the boat."
