Foreword

2025 was an exciting and impactful year for the Harrison County Health Department—a year marked by growth, innovation, and the expansion of community partnerships. It was our first year participating as an opt-in county for Health First Indiana funding through the Indiana Department of Health, and this additional support allowed us to collaborate with partners to launch new programs and initiatives that enhanced the health and well-being of our residents.

Through this funding, the Harrison County YMCA developed a youth nutrition program serving more than 50 children ages 5–12. The Harrison County Emergency Management Agency distributed over 1,500 weather radios to residents in rural areas, and Harrison County Hospital began planning and development of a Mobile Integrated Health Program. Meanwhile, Harrison County Health Department staff continued to provide child passenger safety seat checks and worked alongside community organizations to offer a wide range of services across the county.

The Public Health Nursing (PHN) Division continued its strong support of local schools by providing school-based vaccination clinics for children requiring immunizations. PHN staff also conducted communicable disease investigations, tuberculosis skin testing, and directly observed therapy, along with CPR/First Aid, Stop the Bleed, Stepping on Falls Prevention, and Narcan training. In addition, the division offered on- and off-site vaccination clinics, community education, blood pressure screenings, and participated in numerous community health events. Our School Liaison Program also delivered the Catch My Breath vaping education program to more than 830 fifth- and sixth-grade students in Harrison County Schools.

The Environmental Health Division remained focused on education and compliance as new septic codes and regulatory changes were implemented, including a new retail food code released in April 2025. The team conducted site visits to ensure compliance, completed restaurant, hospital food, and tattoo parlor inspections, monitored mosquito populations, and performed water and pool testing. We also welcomed two new environmental health staff members while celebrating the retirement of a valued team member after 28 years of dedicated service.

The Vital Records Division continued to oversee the filing of vital events, issue birth and death certificates, complete paternity affidavits, and provide adoption and genealogy resources. The Registrar also managed the department's budget and tracked county and grant funding. A strong partnership with the Harrison County Coroner supported the timely recording of critical records. In addition, our Vital Records Registrar serves on the Executive Board of the Indiana Vital Records Association as Treasurer.

The Maternal and Child Health (MCH) Division expanded community partnerships while continuing to provide essential healthcare services to women and families in Harrison County and surrounding areas. Services included prenatal care (up to 20 weeks gestation), family planning, women's health visits, STI testing, and lead testing and investigations. Staff also promoted injury prevention, car seat safety, and other child-focused health initiatives. In September, the team hosted its annual Community Baby Shower, which continues to grow each year and remains a meaningful resource for local families.

2025 was also a busy year for our Preparedness Division. We welcomed a new part-time Preparedness Planner made possible through Health First Indiana funding. The preparedness team participated in the District 9 Emergency Surge Tabletop Exercise, the Medical Response Surge Exercise (MRSE), the Harrison County Full-Scale Exercise in partnership with Floyd County Emergency Management, and the annual Drive-Thru Flu Clinic. Staff also continued to update emergency response plans and strengthen partnerships with local response agencies.

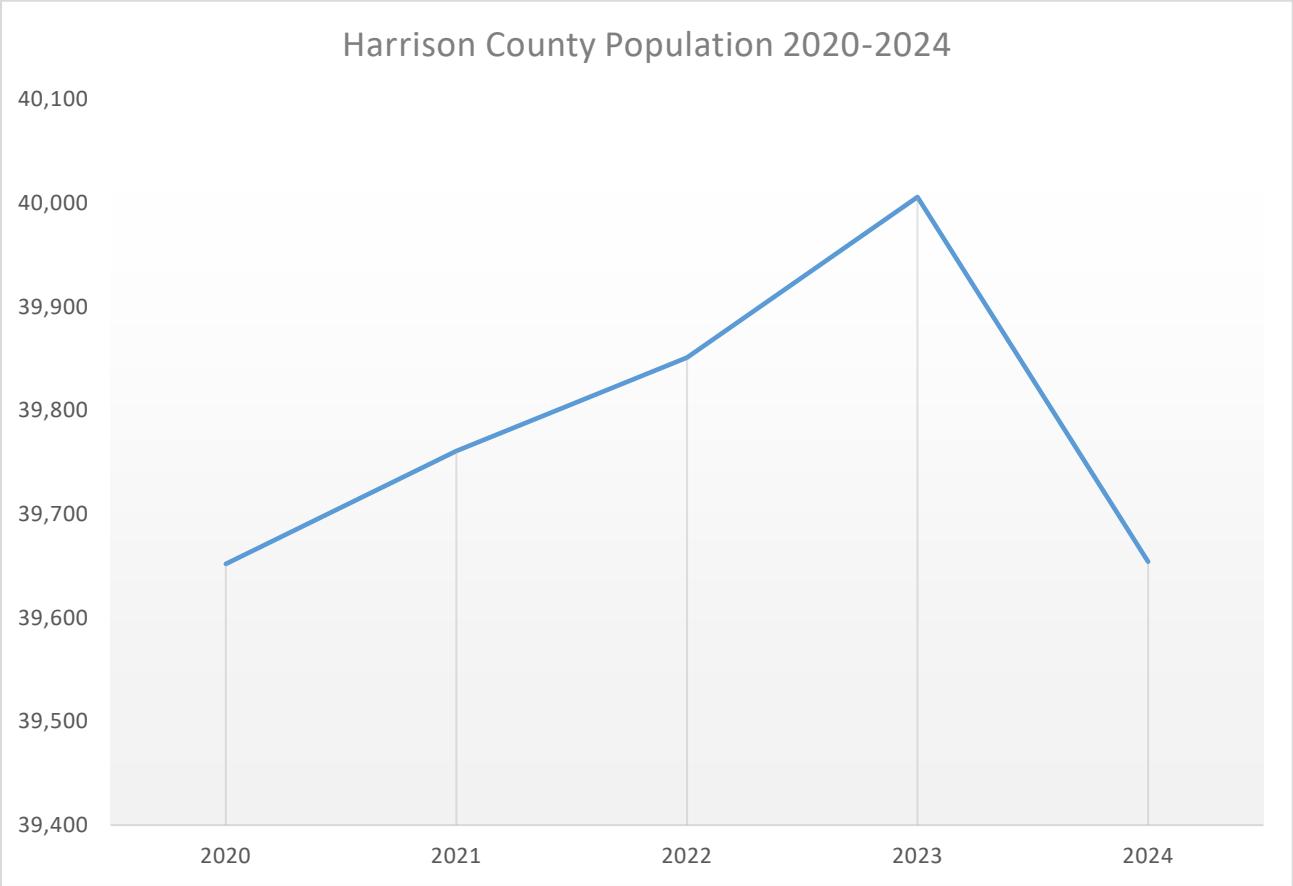

Local Health Maintenance & Trust Account Budget

The Local Health Maintenance Fund (LHMF) and Trust Account Fund (TAF) are both grants from the State Department of Health. They enable the Health Department to provide specific services such as mammograms, colposcopies, PAP smears, and chest x-rays to at-risk, non-insured populations. Nurse salaries are also supported through these grants. These budgets are reimbursed to the county from grants from the Indiana Department of Health and were approved by the Harrison County Council at the end of 2023. Both the Local Health and Trust Accounts were replaced with the Health First Indiana Funding in January of 2024, the remaining balances in the funds will be used to supplement Health Department services

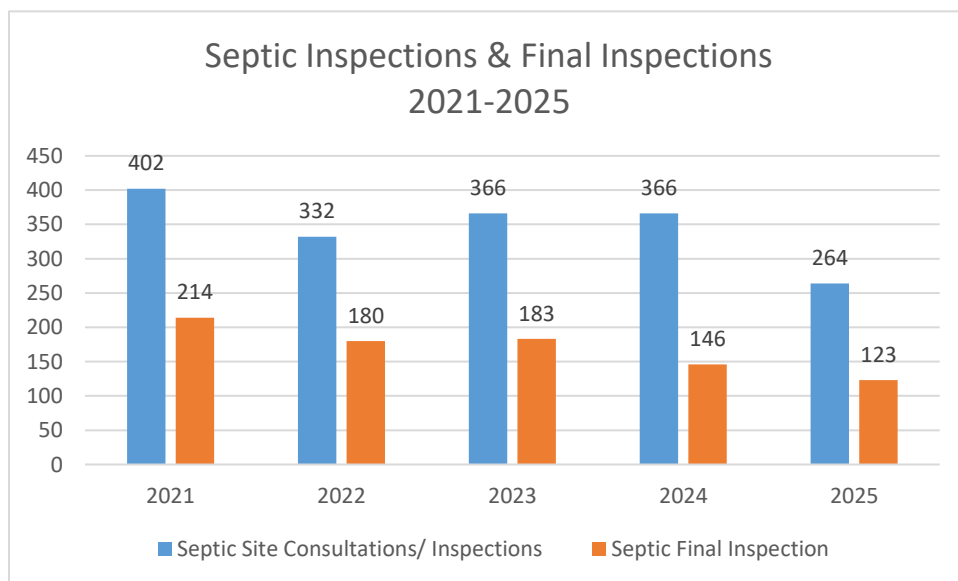
Environmental Division Statistics

The Environmental Division provides oversight for all private septic systems including consultations for site selection and system design, contractor supervision during: pre site installation, installation, and final inspection, also commercial septic systems are reviewed and final inspections are conducted. They work closely with the public to monitor trash and dump site cleanup, septic system leaks and repairs. Also work with the public to increase awareness and direction in regard to radon, mold, lead, and other health hazards that are investigated and mitigated as necessary. Restaurants are inspected and regulated to state health code standards, pools and public swimming facilities are inspected and monitored. Inspections of Tattoo parlors and tattoo artist are completed. Animal bites are investigated; dead birds and other vectors are tested for diseases and mosquitoes are monitored and tested for West Nile Virus and St. Louis Encephalitis.

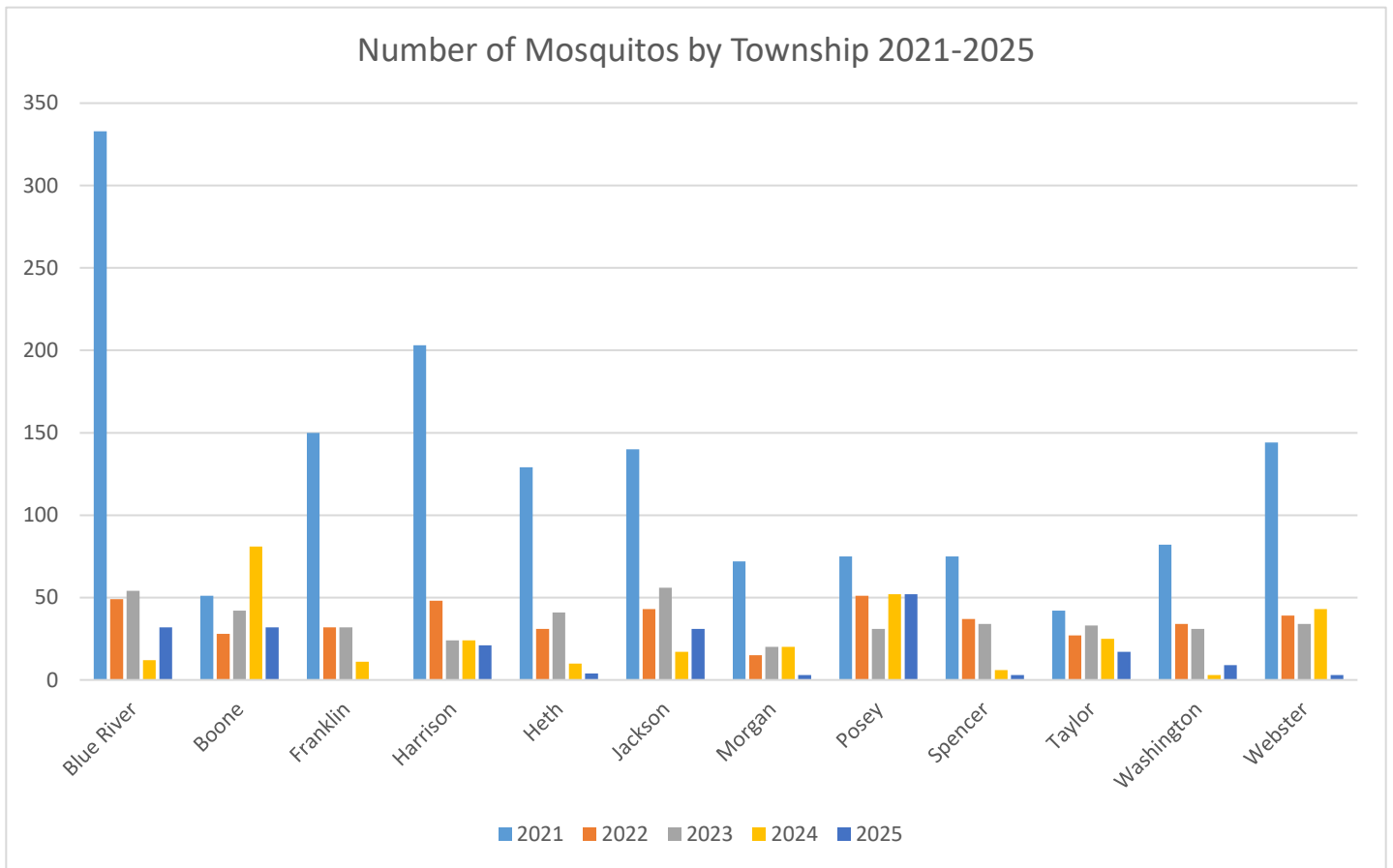

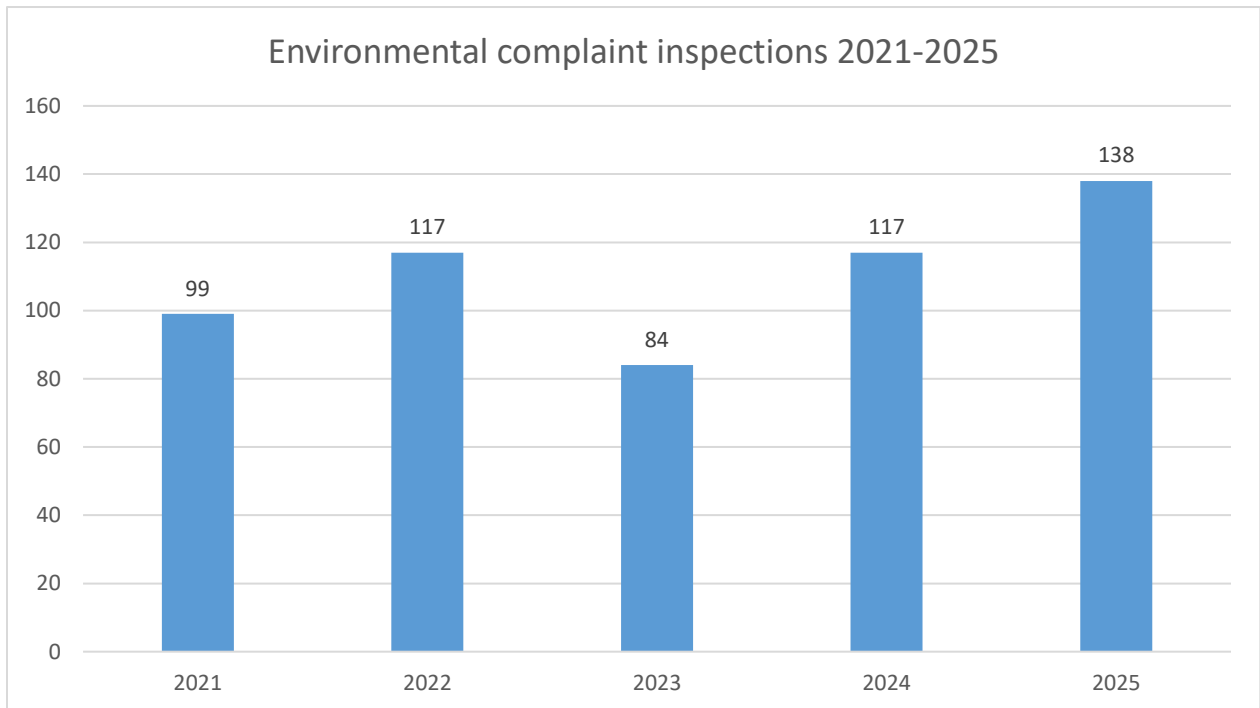
Mosquito Trapping

An independent contractor is used to trap, count, and identify mosquitoes in all townships of the county monthly during peak mosquito season usually from May until September. Once mosquitoes are counted and identified, samples are sent to the Indiana Department of Health laboratory to determine if any are carrying diseases like West Nile Virus, or St Louis Encephalitis. Mosquito counts are used to determine if spraying or other control measures are necessary in an area of the county. Based on initial findings and/or numbers of complaints, time is spent in townships most likely to pose a risk for disease spread. Mosquito dunks are given out as needed to property owners upon request.

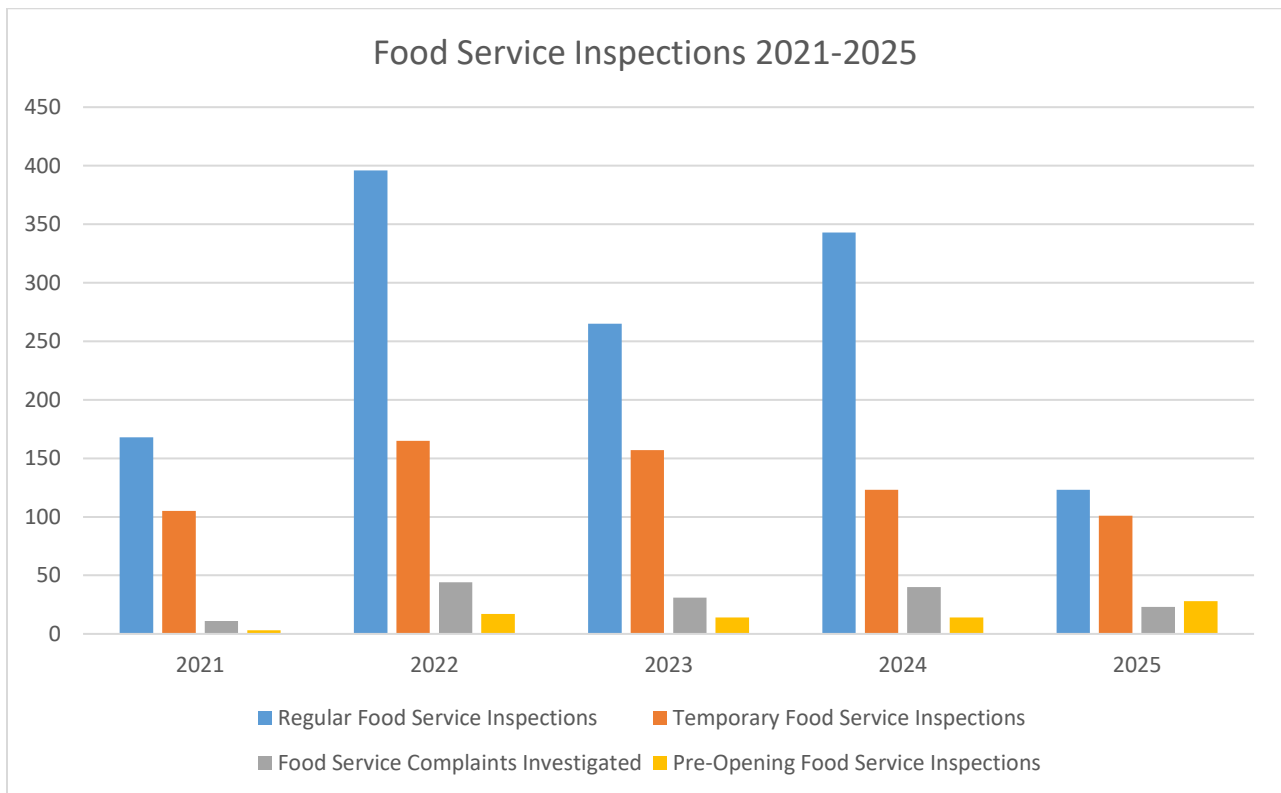

Food Protection

All county restaurants, food establishments, and food vendors are regularly inspected to ensure compliance to state and local food codes/ordinances. Temporary food booths at county fairs and festivals, food carts, and food trucks are also inspected. All new food establishments consult with the department on kitchen planning and food preparation issues prior to opening. Suspected contaminated foods are sent to state labs for testing and any food recalls are communicated to establishments and the general public.

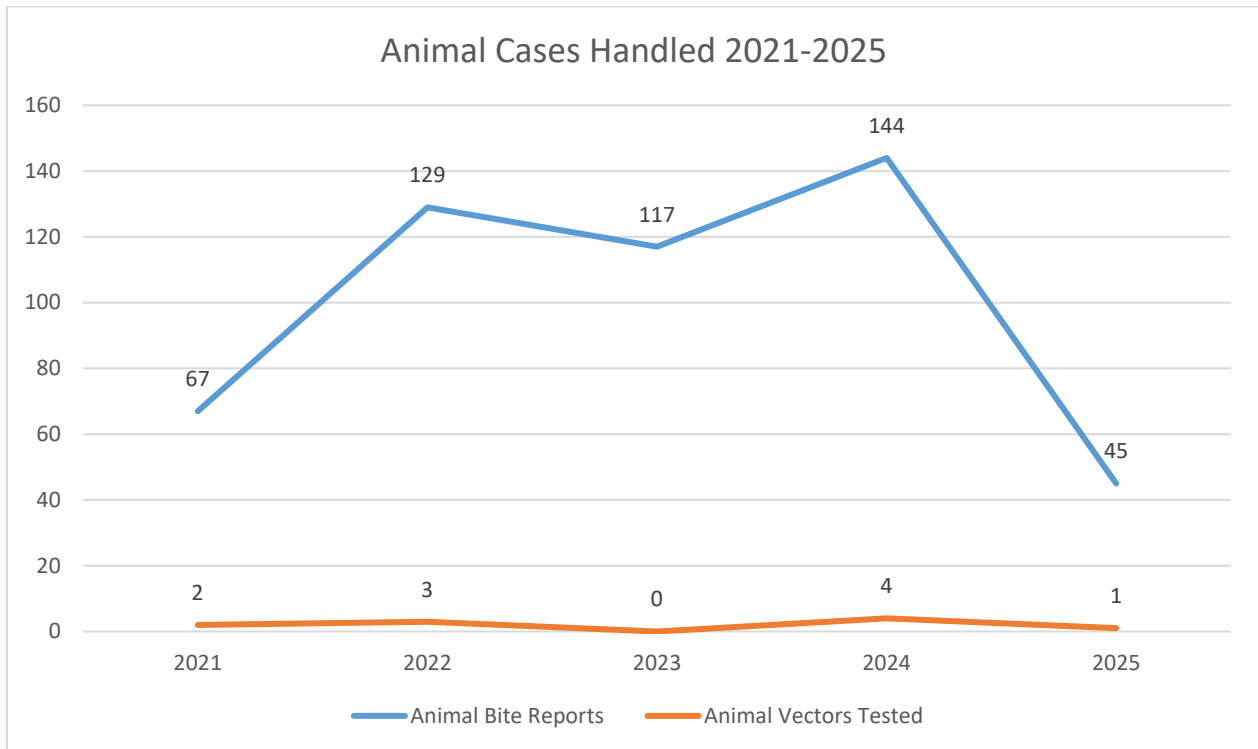

Animal Vectors

Per Indiana Code, all animal bites are reported to the local health department to investigate for possible disease exposure. Certain animals are vectors for disease and dead specimens (as appropriate) are collected for testing. Any suspected animals are sent to the state labs for testing. Letters are sent out to the animal owners informing them of the requirements needed to properly navigate these issues.

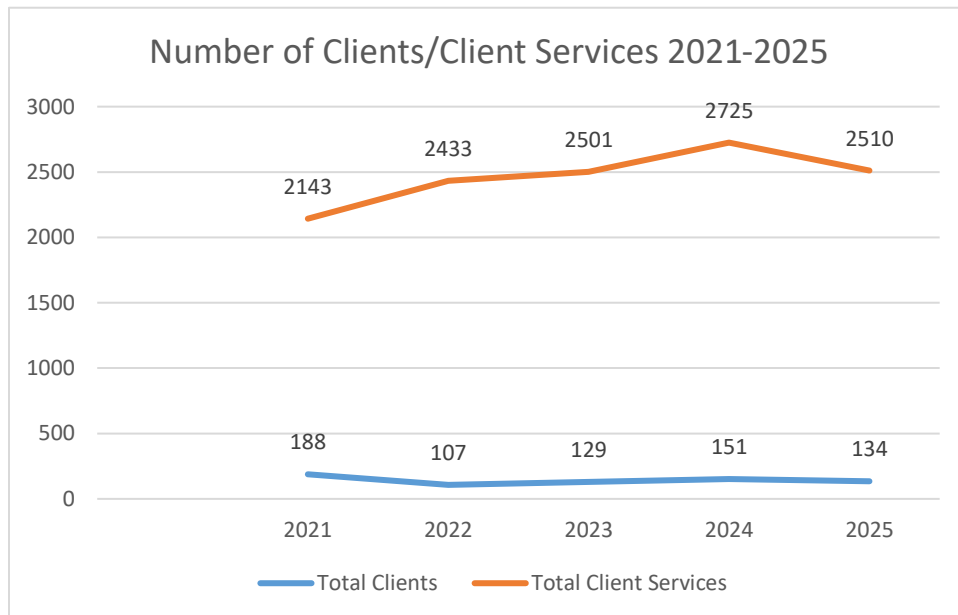
MCH Division Statistics

The Maternal & Child Health Division received funding through the Title V grant issued to us from the state through September 30, 2025. Through this grant, we provide annual well-women visits, pre-conceptual counseling, prenatal/postpartum care and family planning services to all women in Harrison, Crawford and Washington counties in Indiana and to women in Meade County, Kentucky who are uninsured or under-insured regardless of ability to pay. Beginning October 1, 2025, funding was through the HFI grant. We have contracted with our local hospital to provide mammogram screenings and lab work to those women who qualify for our program at no cost to the patient. In addition, we have contracted with the Family Health Center to provide colposcopies with/without biopsy for any patient in our care who is diagnosed with an abnormal pap smear and requires further evaluation. We also offer STD testing, HIV/HEP C testing, Syphilis screening, free pregnancy testing, lab work, car seat assistance, a safe sleep program, sports physicals, employment physicals, men's health services, and drug testing.

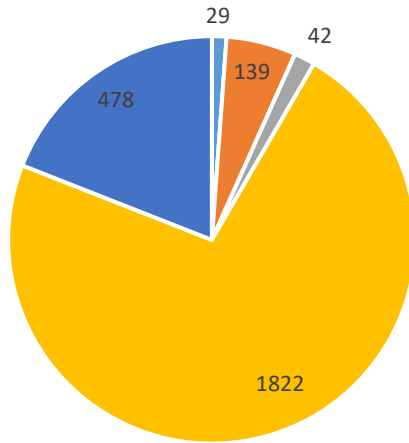
Clinic Services

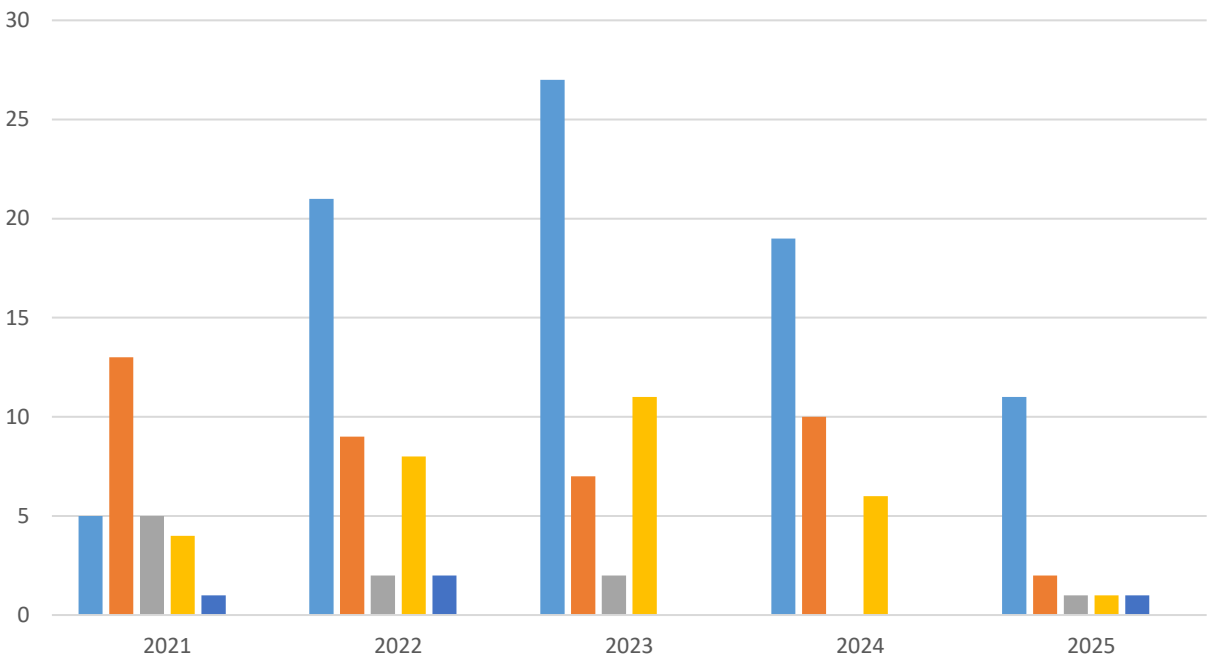


2025 Client Visit Types



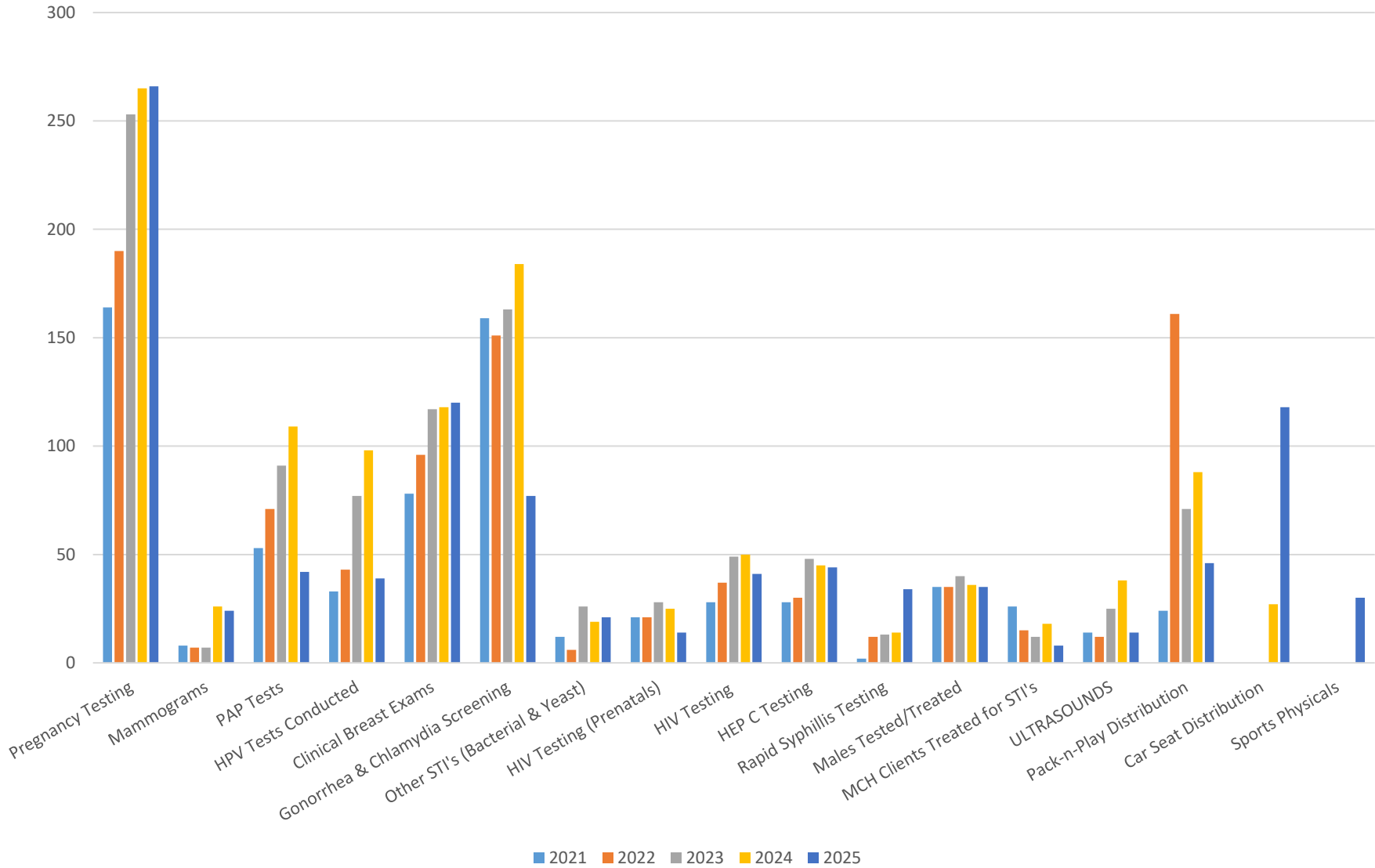

PREPAREDNESS DIVISION REPORT

2025 Preparedness Division Report

During the reporting period, the Harrison County Health Department (HCHD) Preparedness Division focused its efforts on the successful implementation of two Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) grants funded by the Indiana Department of Health (IDOH). These grants supported critical planning, coordination, and capacity-building activities designed to strengthen countywide and regional readiness for public health emergencies and all-hazard incidents.

KEY GRANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

A major accomplishment under the IDOH-funded PHEP initiatives was the expansion and formalization of Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs) with Emergency Support Function 8 (ESF-8) partners. Updated and expanded agreements now clearly define roles, responsibilities, and coordination mechanisms among key response agencies, including Harrison County Hospital, Harrison County Emergency Medical Services, Harrison County Sheriff's Department, Harrison County Fairgrounds, and additional local and regional partners.

Preparedness Division staff also maintained active participation in monthly coordination meetings of the District 9 Healthcare Coalition, reinforcing Harrison County's integration into regional preparedness efforts. Through this collaboration, HCHD staff contributed to shared planning initiatives, strengthened healthcare system coordination, and supported regional preparedness strategies across southern Indiana.

In addition, staff participated in regional planning activities under the Cities Readiness Initiative (CRI), a state-funded preparedness program promoting coordinated community planning among county health departments in the Metro Louisville region. CRI engagement enhanced cross-jurisdictional collaboration related to mass prophylaxis, medical countermeasure distribution, and emergency communications.

The Preparedness Planner also successfully secured external grant funding to represent the Harrison County Health Department at the National Preparedness Summit in San Antonio, Texas. This national conference brought together nearly 5,000 public health and emergency management officials from across the country and provided valuable opportunities for professional development, knowledge exchange, and exposure to national best practices in emergency preparedness and response.

PLANNING AND DOCUMENTATION ACHIEVEMENTS

Over a series of months and following exhaustive research, stakeholder engagement, and best-practice review, the Preparedness Division completed three major planning milestones:

1. Integrated Preparedness Plan (IPP):

A comprehensive planning document aligning public health preparedness, emergency management, healthcare coordination, and community resilience strategies. The IPP provides a unified framework for preparedness, response, recovery, and mitigation activities.

2. Updated County All-Hazards Emergency Operations Plan (EOP):

The County All-Hazards EOP was fully updated to reflect current threats, evolving public health risks, revised ESF-8 coordination protocols, and lessons learned from recent emergencies.

3. Initiated Partner Dialogue on Family Assistance and Behavioral Health:

In coordination with state preparedness initiatives, HCHD engaged in a new dialogue with local and regional partners addressing family reunification, family assistance operations, victim's advocacy and mental & behavioral health considerations during disaster response and recovery. These discussions strengthened shared understanding of roles, referral pathways, and coordination needs to better support affected individuals and families following emergency incidents.

Together, these efforts significantly strengthen Harrison County's preparedness posture and ensure alignment with state and federal preparedness expectations.

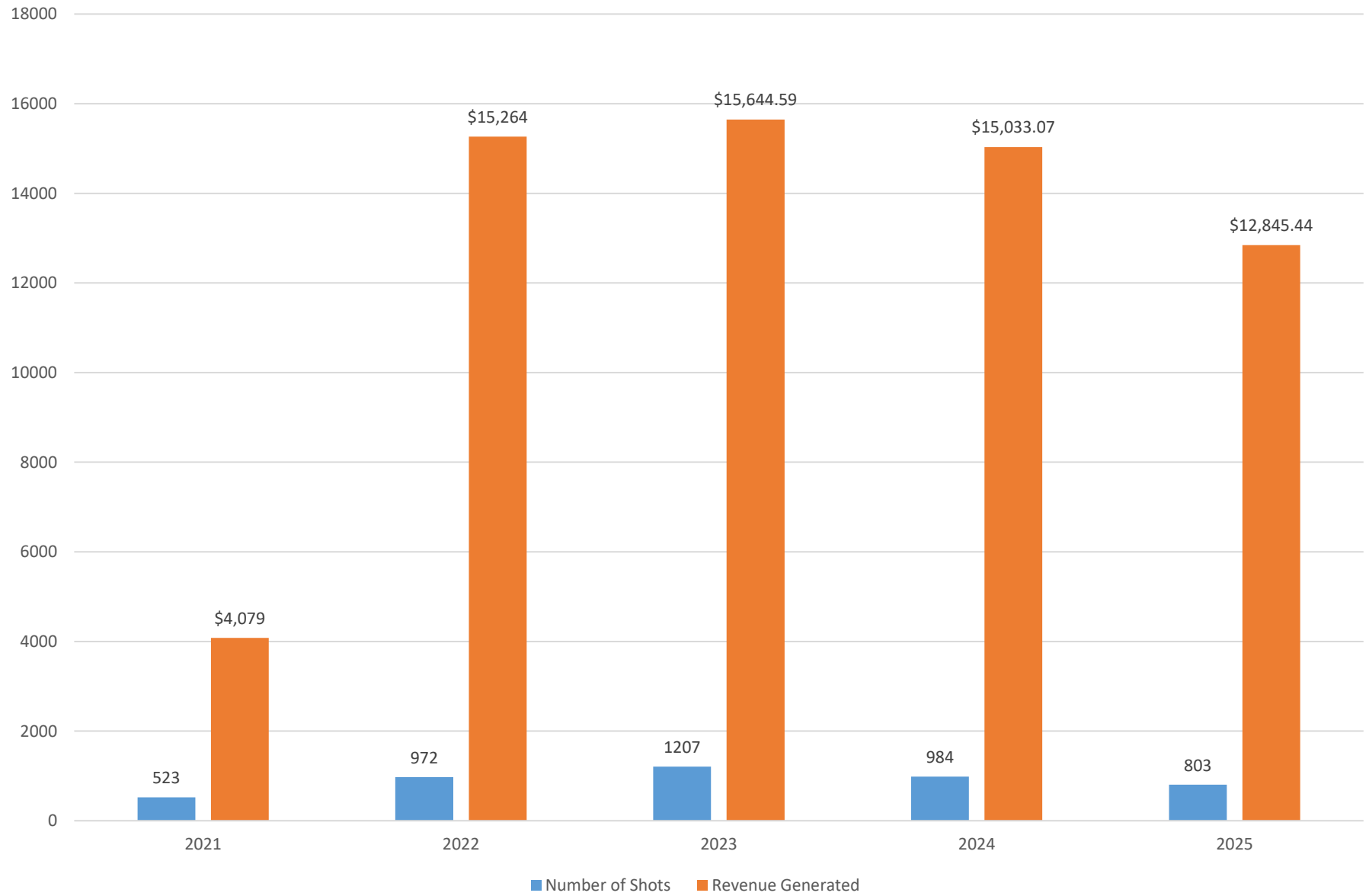
Vaccines & Immunizations

The Public Health Nursing Division provides vaccinations and other injections to all age groups. The Health Department participates in the Vaccines for children (VFC) program where eligible children receive vaccinations for free. The division participates in the adult 317 program and can offer adult vaccines for free to individuals who are uninsured or underinsured. For insured individuals, the division bills most private insurance through a billing system called vaxcare.

Additional adult vaccines are purchased with Riverboat Funds. These vaccines are utilized for Harrison County firefighters and other essential personnel free of charge. Other adults are charged for the cost of the vaccine and monies collected go back into county funds.

Flu Clinic

The Harrison County Health Department and the Harrison County Hospital conduct a joint drive-through influenza clinic every year. This clinic also tests the Emergency Operations Plan for setting up a mass immunization or a point of dispensing clinic during an emergency. The clinic was held at the Harrison County Fairgrounds on October 7, 2025, and a total of 89 flu shots were administered.

Stepping On Falls Prevention Program

Harrison County Health Department and Harrison County Hospital provide a community-based small group program designed to reduce falls and build confidence in older adults. Anna Jones, BSN, RN is a Stepping On Instructor.

Catch My Breath Anti-Vaping Program

Beginning in 2024, the Public Health Nursing Division and Maternal Child Health Division have worked together with Lifespan Resources to go into the local school systems to teach the 5th and 6th grade students about respiratory health and the importance of not vaping/smoking. This program consists of 4, 40-minute sessions.

Communicable Diseases

By Indiana Law (410 IAC 1-2.3-47), hospitals, physicians, and labs must provide information to the local Health Department on a list of communicable diseases. This rule was greatly expanded at the end of 2016 to include many more reportable diseases. The Public Health Nursing Division then investigates each reported case and provides follow up information to the Indiana Department of Health (IDH) on these diseases. IDH reports all our local findings to the Centers for Diseases Control and Prevention (CDC). The following diseases were documented to have occurred in Harrison County in 2025.

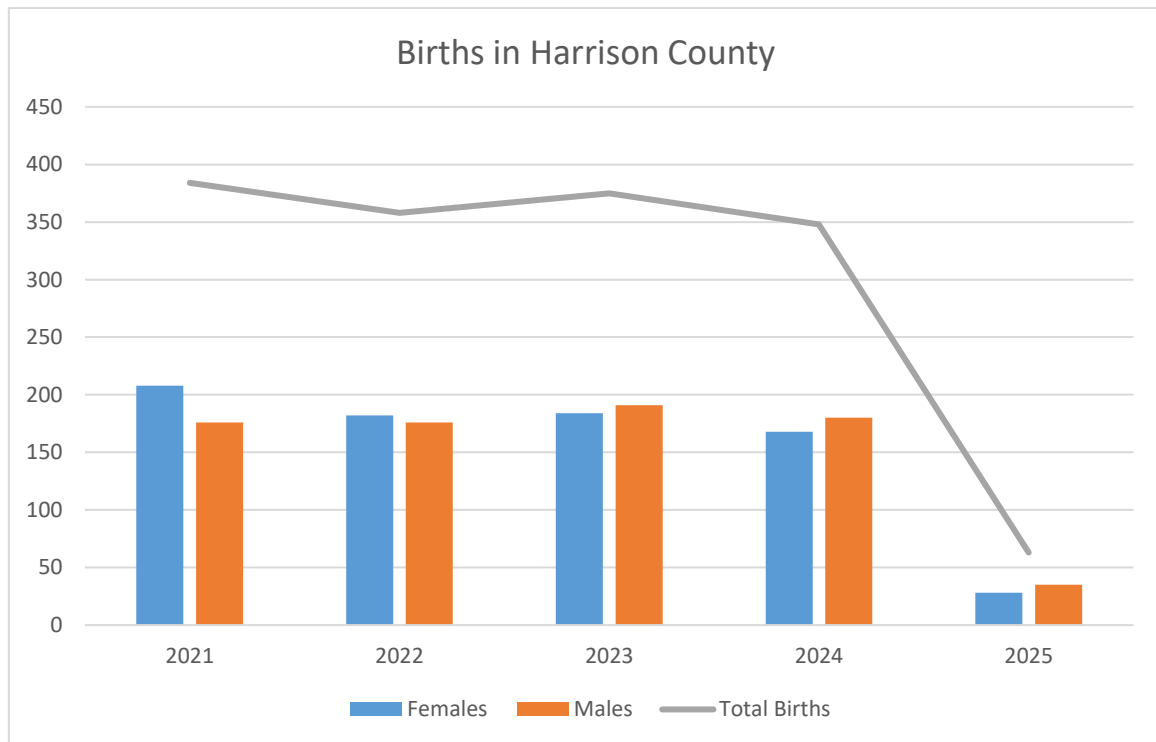
Vital Records

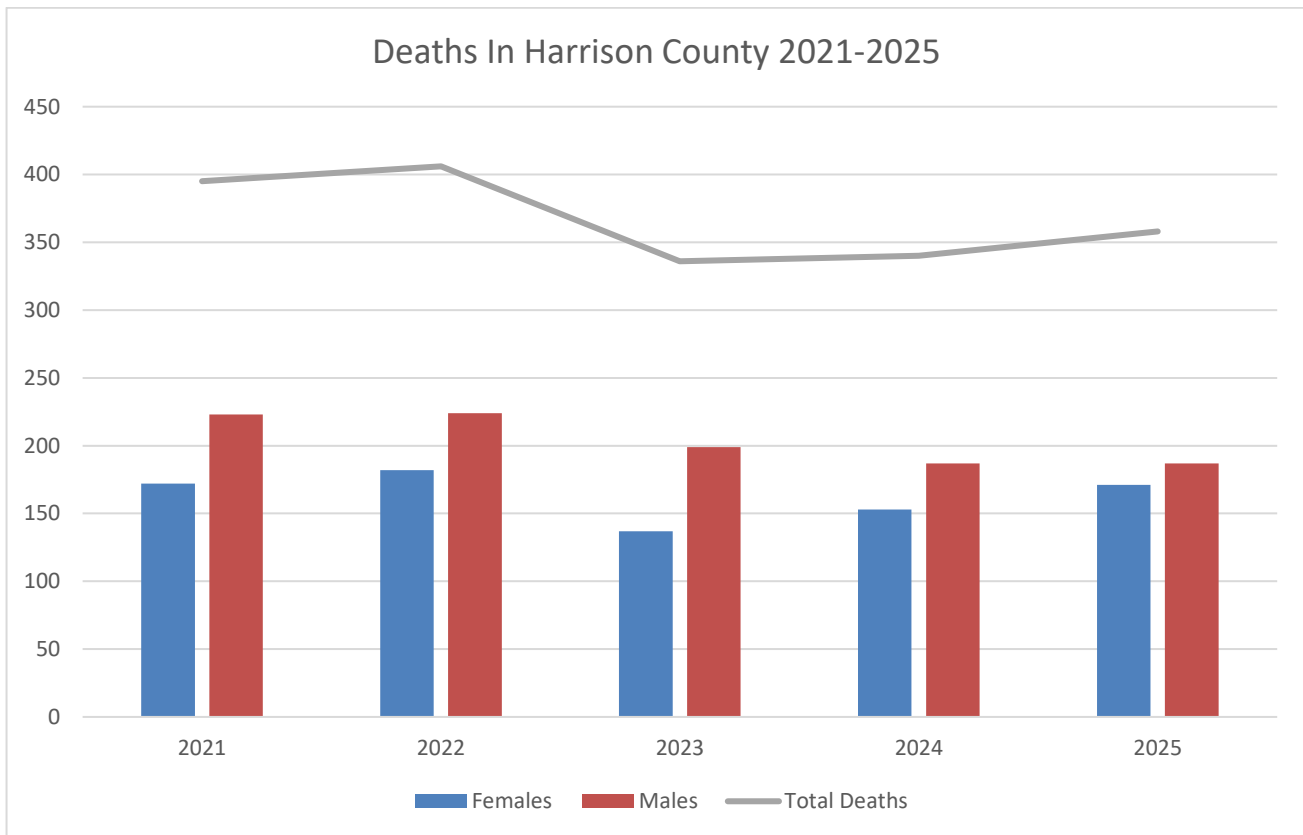

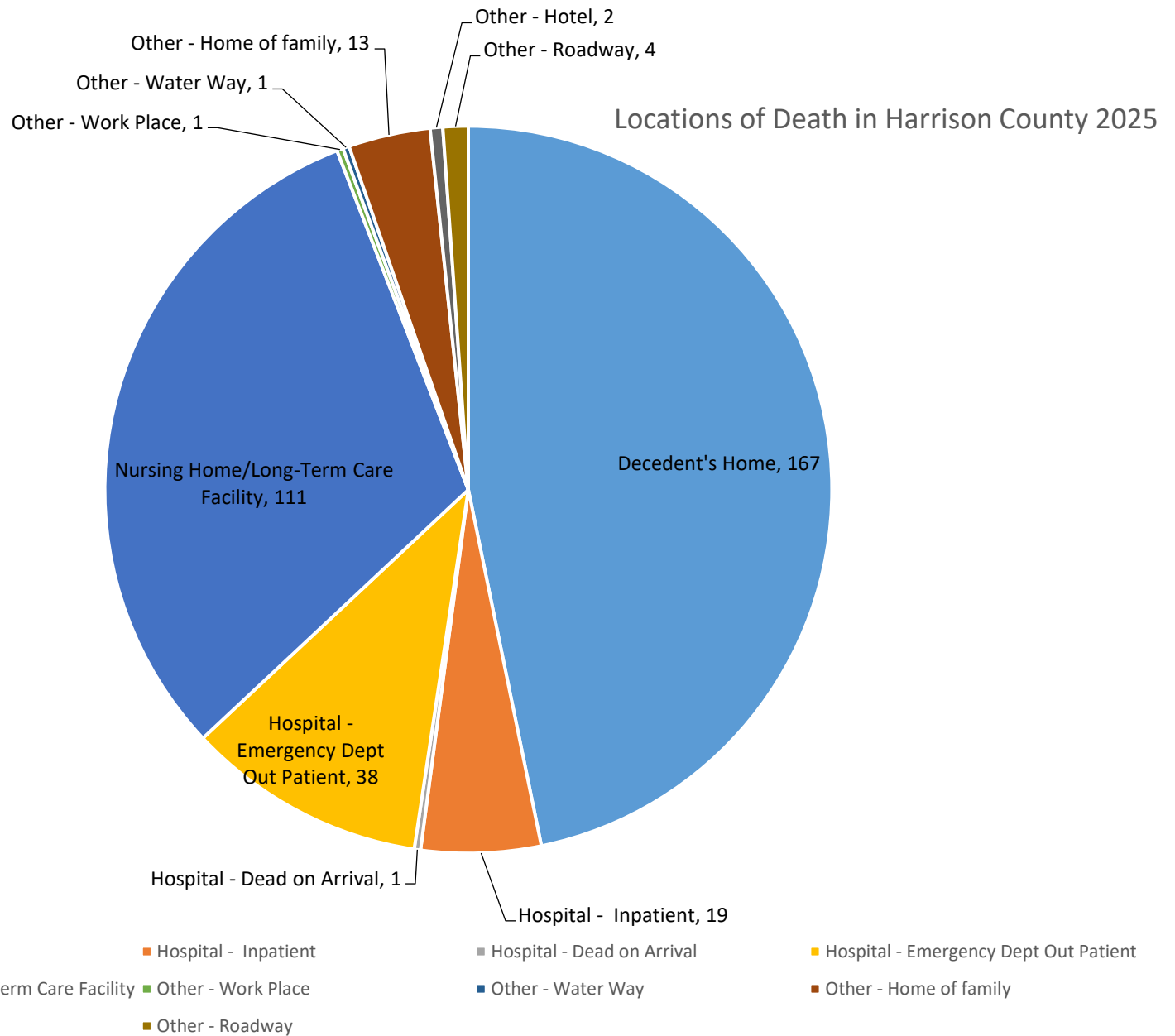

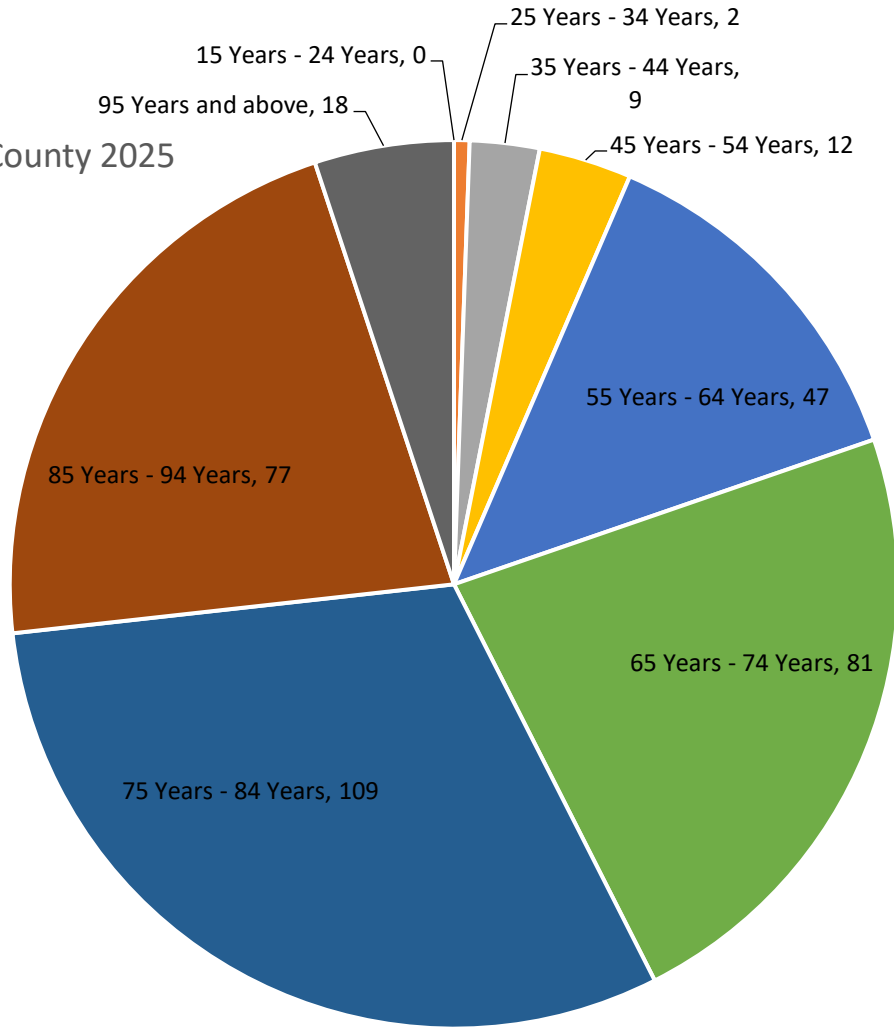
