#### **Decentralized System**

"An onsite or cluster wastewater system that is used to treat and dispose of relatively small volumes of wastewater, generally from individual or groups of dwellings and businesses"



### Decentralized Treatment is Important Nationally

- 25% of population served
- 33% of new construction
- Small communities: 11% of need
- > 50% in suburbs or cities



## Water Quality Problems on a National Scale

- 10-30% of systems failing annually
- Over 50% of systems >30 yrs. old
- Not meeting Clean Water Act goals



# Water Quality Problems on a National Scale

- Factor in beach impairment (36%)
- Shellfish bed closures (32%)
- 168,000 viral, 34,000 bacterial illnesses per year (gw sources)
- 5,281 pathogen, 4,773 nutrientimpaired water bodies







### National Guidelines for Management

- Draft published October, 2000
- Gives EPA's recommendations
- Institutionalizes the concept
- Goals for management programs
- Voluntary



## What is a Management Program?

- Public awareness and acceptance
- Water quality protection requirements
- Siting, sizing, design and installation



## What is a Management Program?

- Operation and maintenance
- Residuals management
- Monitoring and reporting
- Enforcement (if needed)



### National Guidelines for Management

- 5 "Model Programs"
- Cover new and existing systems
- Surface and subsurface discharge
- Do not supersede existing laws



#### Program 1: System Inventory/ Maintenance Awareness





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- Conventional septic systems
- Database of system locations
- Proper siting, installation
- Record, reminder of maintenance



## Program 2: Management through Maintenance Contract






## Program 2: Management through Maintenance Contract

- Enables more complex options
- Homeowner contracts with service provider
- Routine maintenance assured



# Program 3: Management through Operating Permits






## Program 3: Management through Operating Permits

- Performance requirements requiring engineered designs
- Renewable operating permits
- Regular reporting, monitoring
- Homeowner responsible



### Program 4: Utility Operation and Maintenance



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- "Utility" management entity
- Responsible for O&M, permit
- Routine inspections
- Consistent performance
- Private ownership retained



# Program 5: Utility Ownership and Management





## Program 5: Utility Ownership and Management

- Professional management of all functions
- Consistent with other utility services (gas, electric, phone...)
- Enables area-wide planning
