Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP):

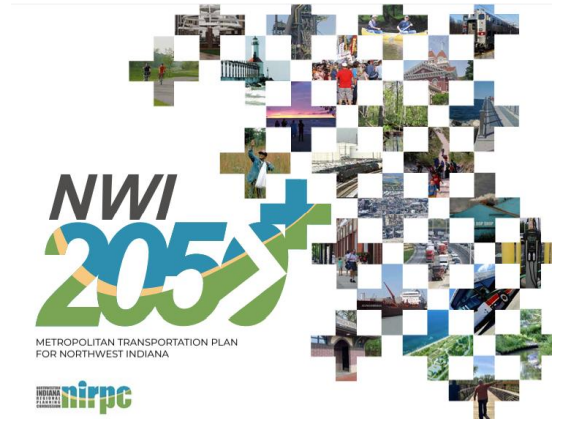
A long-range plan that sets regional policy for the development of a multimodal transportation system to facilitate the safe and efficient movement of people and goods

- Required by Federal law as part of a continuous, comprehensive, and cooperative (3C) planning process
- Must have at least a 20-year horizon
- Must be fiscally constrained
- Must be updated every four years



NWI 2050+ UPDATE

- Carry over vision and major goals of *NWI 2050+*
- Maintain the horizon year of 2050
- Maintain organization of *NWI 2050+*
- Incorporate new data and public and stakeholder feedback
 - Update all federal and regional performance measures and indicators
- Update technical components of plan: socioeconomic forecasts, financial plan, air quality conformity
- Focus on specific implementation actions including regionally significant projects

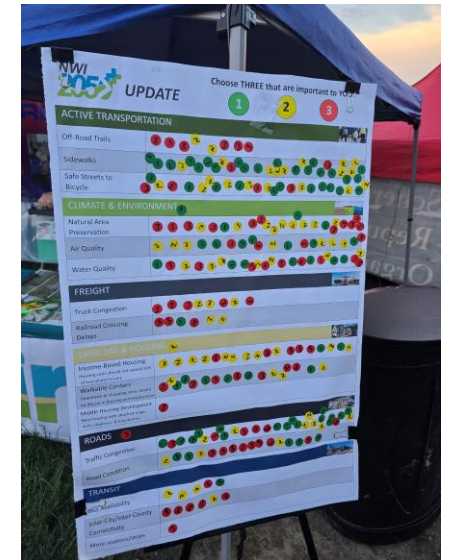

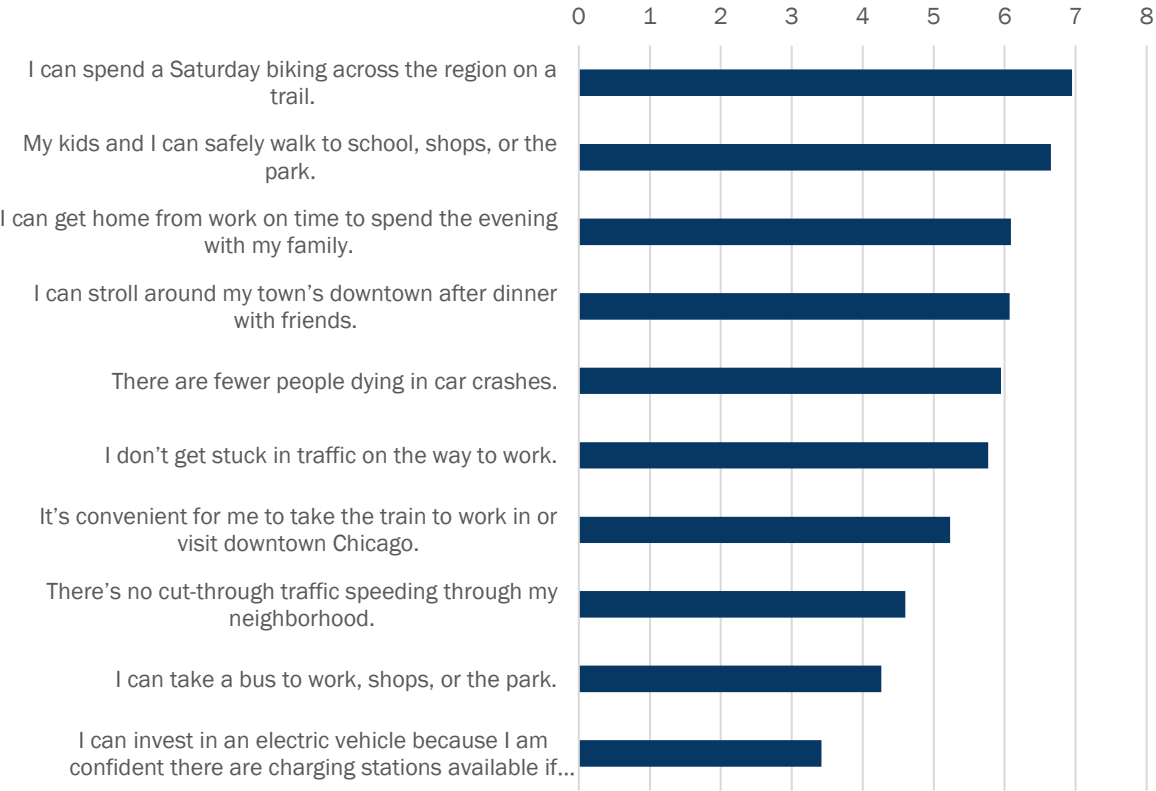

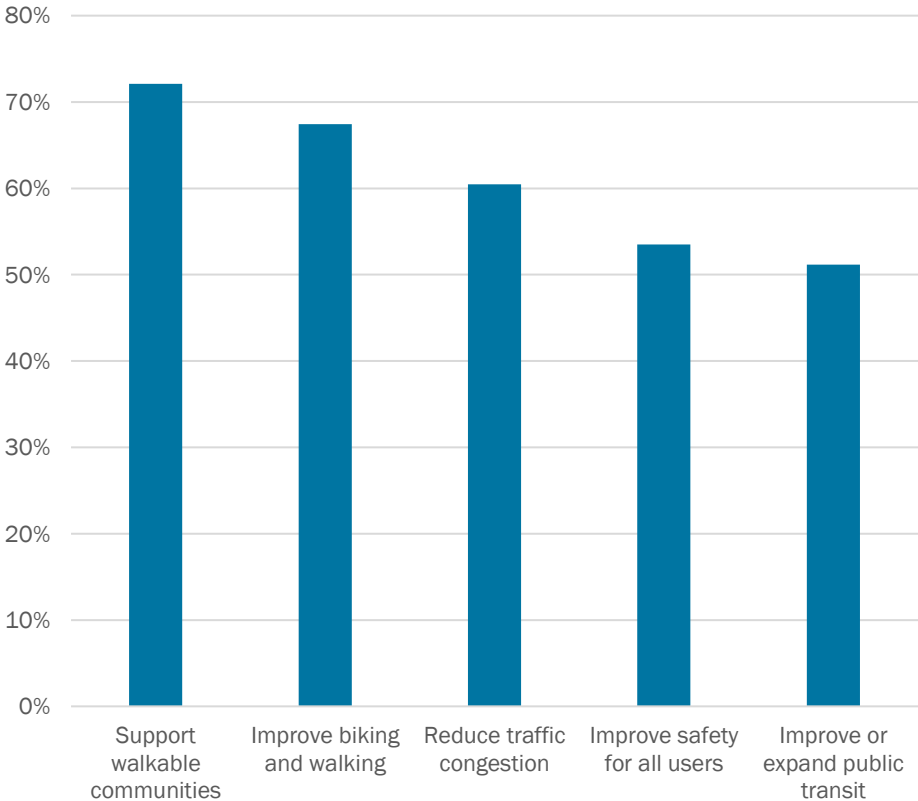

• By 2050, Northwest Indiana will achieve a population of about 900,000. New growth will have a gross density of about 4-5 units per acre.	• Develop favorable planning and regulatory practices for middle- and high-density development in appropriate locations.	• Track middle housing development in the last 10 years • Population increases towards the 2050+ goal. • Housing increases towards the 2050+ goal.	The yearly growth rate met the 0.55% goal in 2024. However, the average growth rate in the last five years is 0.23%. Porter County has a strong housing market, with a 6% growth rate that exceeds the NWI 2050+ goal of 4%. Although more new housing units have been built in Lake County, the growth rate shows a moderate 3% increase on average between 2020 and 2024. 	• Support transportation infrastructure that supports the development of walkable districts and "town centers."	• Improved street network connectivity • Employment in "Main Centers" • Population in "Main Centers" & 15-minute walk	NIRPC established the Local Technical Assistance (LTA) Program to provide funding for planning projects in Tier 2 that fund walkable districts, Town Centers plans, and pedestrian plans. The analysis shows an increase in population in the main and neighborhood centers of small- to medium-sized communities such as Winfield, Lake Station, South La Porte, and Munster. However, it was noted that some of the larger communities lost population to the main centers. Employment has increased significantly in South Hammond, Miller/Aetna, the <u>Hessville</u> neighborhood in Hammond, South La Porte, Lake Station, East Chicago, and Griffith.
