What is Stew-MAP?

- Stew-MAP = Stewardship Mapping and Assessment Project
- Method for learning about volunteer & not-forprofit environmental stewardship in an urban area
- Created by Forest Service researchers & University partners in New York City. Conducted so far in NYC, Baltimore, Seattle, and the Chicago Wilderness region. More are underway. (check them all out at

What is Stew-MAP?

- The "who, what, where, why and how" of urban environmental stewardship
- No group too big or too small to participate
- We focused primarily on civic stewardship, but ready to included all types of stewardship (but other cities doing STEW-MAP focus on civic—that is, nongovernmental and not business stewardship only).





We are looking at stewardship activities throughout the Chicago Wilderness region – the largest StewMAP territory to date.



What is Stewardship?

Very broad, inclusive definition of stewardship, all of these are examples we consider stewardship activities:

- Restoring a prairie or woodland
- Advocating for trucks or busses to stop idling on your street corner in order to improve air quality
- Creating new outdoor recreation opportunities
- Teaching school kids about water quality

What groups might be doing this Stewardship?


The obvious groups like the Field Museum, Save the Dunes, Shirley Heinze Land Trust.


- But also:

 - Energy conservation programs








What can we do with STEW-MAP data?



This map shows you the stewards in and around the Wooded island in Jackson Park.

With STEW-MAP, we can look at where stewardship is taking place, and where it isn't. We can look at the groups that are caring for a particular location. With that information, we can make new connections, and perhaps engage more stewards to care for more places.



How do you see this type of database being useful for you? We want to know.

In NYC, the data has helped stewards find others to work with. It has helped funders find stewards.
