


73% of local government leaders say libraries play an important or highly important role in providing access to high-speed Internet service.

Connectivity That Transforms



Approximately **73 percent of libraries** offer training and services to help people apply for jobs and 90 percent of libraries offer digital training.



77% of patrons aged 12-17 visit public libraries to do school work.



Entrepreneurs make 2.8 million monthly visits to support their small businesses, using services such as online market research, 3D printing and business planning support.



Patrons can borrow mobile hotspots and download reading materials, music and movies from the library, taking connectivity and content wherever they go.





More than **97 percent** of libraries assist patrons in using online government services, such as filing taxes and applying for permits.



Libraries host 4.7 million programs every year, offering everything from social media training for seniors to basic coding and small business management.



Libraries are important partners in advancing broadband connectivity and use.
