ANNUAL REPORT FOR PROGRAMS IN NURSING

Guidelines: An Annual Report prepared and submitted by the faculty of the school of nursing, will provide the Indiana State Board of Nursing with a clear picture of how the nursing program is currently operating and its compliance with the regulations governing the professional and/or practical nurse education program(s) in the State of Indiana. The Annual Report is intended to inform the Education Subcommittee and the Indiana State Board of Nursing of program operations during the academic reporting year. This information will be posted on the Board's website and will be available for public viewing.

Purpose: To provide a mechanism to provide consumers with information regarding nursing programs in Indiana and monitor complaints essential to the maintenance of a quality nursing education program.

Directions: To complete the Annual Report form attached, use data from your academic reporting year unless otherwise indicated. An example of an academic reporting year may be: August 1, 2012 through July 31, 2013. Academic reporting years may vary among institutions based on a number of factors including budget year, type of program delivery system, etc. Once your program specifies its academic reporting year, the program must utilize this same date range for each consecutive academic reporting year to insure no gaps in reporting. You must complete a **SEPARATE report** for each PN, ASN and BSN program.

This form is due to the Indiana Professional Licensing Agency by the close of business on October 1st each year. The form must be electronically submitted with the original signature of the Dean or Director to: <u>PLA2@PLA.IN.GOV</u>. Please place in the subject line "Annual Report (Insert School Name) (Insert Type of Program) (Insert Academic Reporting Year). For example, "Annual Report ABC School of Nursing ASN Program 2013." 1B.) If you identified your performance as declining, what steps is the program taking to address this issue?

In 2010, faculty adopted the Kaplan Admission test and began to use the Reading Comprehension score as part of the admission process in 2011 for the Class of 2014. The admission score is composed of 75% of the cumulative pre-nursing GPA and 25% of the Reading Comprehension score on the Kaplan test. The 2013 class was the last class that did not have the Reading Comprehension score as part of the admission requirements. Faculty believe that the NCLEX scores of the class of 2014 will reflect this additional assessment.

2B.) If <u>not</u>, explain how you assess student readiness for the NCLEX.

Beginning in 2004, achieving a set score on an exit examination was required for students to graduate. From 2004 through 2010, the exit examination used was prepared by HESI. In the spring 2010, faculty chose the Kaplan testing service to provide the exit examination. Students were required to attain a score of 65 or not graduate. Students who did not achieve 65 took a 1 hour summer course that provided intense preparation for the exam. Until 2011 all were successful in passing the exit examination after the summer course. NCLEX pass rates were near the national rate. In the spring, 2012, on the advice of the faculty consultant at Kaplan, faculty agreed that students would not have to achieve a set score on the exit exam, but would have to complete remediation on the tests they did not achieve a score of 62 or higher. In September 2012, the National Council State Boards of Nursing announced that the required score to pass the NCLEX was being increased effective April 2013. Our NCLEX 2013 scores declined.

Students are informed that a criminal background check is required for admission during freshman orientation. They are reminded again when the application process begins in the spring of the freshman year. Applications are not processed without a completed criminal background check.

Criminal background checks are renewed annually in August for all students in the program until graduation.

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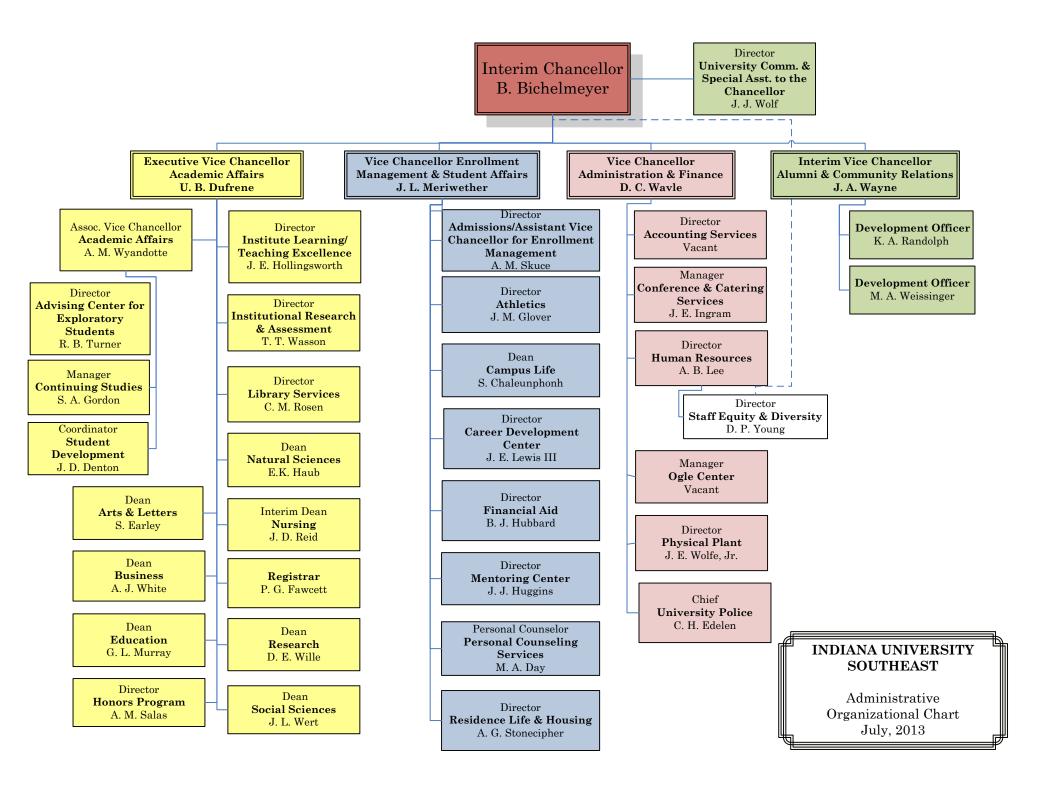
Definitions from CCNE:

Potential Complainants

A complaint regarding an accredited program may be submitted by any individual who is directly affected by the actions or policies of the program. This may include students, faculty, staff, administrators, nurses, patients, employees, or the public.

Guidelines for the Complainant

The CCNE Board considers formal requests for implementation of the complaint process provided that the complainant: a) illustrates the full nature of the complaint in writing, describing how CCNE standards or procedures have been violated, and b) indicates his/her willingness to allow CCNE to notify the program and the parent institution of the exact nature of the complaint, including the identity of the originator of the complaint. The Board may take whatever action it deems appropriate regarding verbal complaints, complaints that are submitted anonymously, or complaints in which the complainant has not given consent to being identified.

4) Change in Dean or Director?

In February, 2013, Marion McKay resigned from the Dean position and Jacquelyn Reid was appointed Interim Dean. A search is in progress for a permanent Dean. Interim Dean Reid will retire at the end of the academic year in which a new dean is appointed.

7) Does the program have adequate library resources?

The IU Southeast Library has adequate resources in the form of online access to CINAHL or Medline through EBSCOHOST or OVID. Books become outdated and many are inaccurate when published so the purchase of books for the library is no longer occurs.

9) Major changes in curriculum (list if positive response)

The Indiana Council on Higher Education mandated that all state university baccalaureate programs be limited to 120 hours. In 2012, the curriculum of IU Southeast School was brought into compliance with that requirement. The revised curriculum was adopted by faculty 5/9/13 and implemented the fall of 2013. Changes to the curriculum were presented to students already in the program and those being admitted to the program. A copy of the current curriculum plan is attached.
