Pursuant to Indiana Code 4-22, as the Small Business Ombudsman, I have reviewed the economic impact analysis for small businesses associated with the rule changes contained in LSA Document #20-476 proposed by the Indiana Board of Animal Health.

Based on my assessment as the Small Business Ombudsman, I have concluded that the proposed rule will not have a negative impact on small businesses.

The economic impact statement prepared by the Indiana Board of Animal Health, "The proposed rule does not increase annual reporting, record keeping, or other administrative costs for regulated entities. As described above, the FSMA requirements were already put in place for manufacturing grade plants in 2016 (LSA #16-222)."

Based upon this statement and review, the Small Business Ombudsman supports the proposed rule related to the economic impact to small business if the Indiana Board of Animal Health conclusion reflects the actual result after promulgation.
