Chairman Ryan Mishler called the meeting to order at 1:00 PM. Chairman Mishler introduced the minutes, Representative Jeff Thompson motioned to approve the minutes, Senator Niezgodski seconded the motion. Chairman Mishler introduced the agenda and there were no proposed amendments.

Agency Projects

Department of Administration

Matt Kent, CFO for the Department of Administration, presented the FY27 preventive maintenance allocations.

Indiana State Police

Captain Mick McClanahan presented the roof replacement and post rehabilitation projects.

Indiana Law Enforcement Academy

Superintendent Anthony Scott presented the shooting range renovation project. Chairman Mishler clarified that the request is not part of the new shooting range construction project and is instead renovated the older shooting range facility. Superintendent Scott noted that there was no knowledge of ricochet risk when constructing the emergency vehicle course.

Adjutant General's Office

Maj. Gen. Larry Muennich presented the Lafayette Boiler Replacement and Warsaw Armory Utility Extension projects.

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Department of Natural Resources

Greg Sorrels, Deputy Director and CFO of DNR, presented the Falls of the Ohio Pavilion construction.

Indiana State Museum and Historic Sites

Cathy Ferre, CFO of Indiana State Museum and Historic Sites (ISMHS), presented the Whitewater Canal comprehensive preservation project, New Harmony Community House moisture mitigation project, and the Angel Mounds Visitor Center panel replacement project. ISMHS noted that the agenda reflected the Whitewater Canal comprehensive preservation project incorrectly, and the replacement of the boat alongside lock 25 will not be included in this project.

Board of Animal Health

Gary Haynes, Chief of Staff for the Indiana Board of Animal Health, presented the Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (ADDL) equipment project.

Indiana Correctional Industries

Mike Jones, Controller for Indiana Correctional Industries, presented the commissary forklift truck replacement project.

Department of Correction

Kevin Orme, Executive Director of the DOC Construction Services Division, presented the secure housing entry doors project, individual housing unit door replacement project, and the West and Central dorm roof replacement. Representative DeLaney asked if there were recent efforts to mitigate the safety and fire concerns in DOC facilities given recent events. Director Orme responded that they are completing mock fire testing and safety protocols to ensure fire safety in prison facilities across the State. Director Orme also responded that the air duct work has been replaced to mitigate fire concerns. Director Orme noted they are using noncombustible paint to reduce flammability of existing layers of paint. Director Orme noted that they are reducing the ability to manipulate lighting fixtures to prevent inmates from having access to potentially dangerous equipment. They have procured various equipment at each facility and re-training employees on procedures. Representative DeLaney asked if IDOC was looking at reducing wiring issues. Director Orme noted that it was being addressed. Representative DeLaney asked if age of the Indiana State Prison was a concern, and Director Orme noted that the building is old but due to a growing prison population they cannot do without it. Representative DeLaney noted that the State is getting \$292 a day for ICE detainees and asked if that funding is being used for repairs. Director Orme to Commissioner Arnold and the CFO for financial questions noting that existing repairs are being funded internally at this time. Chairman Mishler noted that the original agreement to fund the new prison was to phase out Michigan City. Chairman Mishler noted that Federal reimbursements go to the General Fund. Representative DeLaney noted that Michigan City facility was going to be closed to the benefit of the community, but Chairman Mishler noted that the intention was to phase it out with no specific use identified.. Chairman Mishler stated that he was not aware of any local agreement on use of the Michigan City facility.

Department of Transportation

Nathan Hood, Assistant Statewide Facilities Director, presented the Indianapolis Subdistrict and salt dome concrete wall repair projects. Chairman Mishler asked how many salt domes the State has, Mr. Hood noted 118. Chairman Mishler asked if a majority were in the Northern portion of the State, Mr. Hood noted a likely 60/40 split but was happy to follow up if necessary.

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Indiana State Fair Commission

Kristina Hannon, CFO for the State Fair Commission, presented the Grand Hall roof replacement project, technology equipment & infrastructure upgrade project, and the Champions pavilion roof replacement project.

University Projects

Ivy Tech Community College

Brooke Burtnett, Senior Director of Public Policy for Dentons Bingham Greenebaum, presented the Terre Haute health renovation project and the Sellersburg Technical Center capital project.

Indiana University

Zach Smith Howard, Director of State Relations for Indiana University, presented the Regional Deferred Maintenance project.

Purdue University

Kendra Leatherman, Director of Government Relations for Purdue University, presented the land purchase and Roberts Impact Lab renovation projects.

Vincennes University

Tony Hahn, Vice President of Government and Legal Affairs at Vincennes University, presented the George Rogers Clark residence hall renovation project and the steam plant renovation project.

Review Items

Professional Licensing Agency

Nicholas Hart, Deputy Director for the Professional Licensing Agency, presented the Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology Interstate Compact.

Horse Racing Commission

David Rothenberg, General Counsel, presented the Thoroughbred registration late fee.

Criminal Justice Institute

Douglas Huntsinger, Executive Director of the Criminal Justice Institute, presented the Strengthening Community Supervision and Victims of Human Trafficking services grants.

Department of Natural Resources

Greg Sorrels, Deputy Director and CFO of DNR, presented the Groundwater and Streamflow Information grant.

Indiana Economic Development Corporation

David Watkins, Senior Vice President of Entrepreneurship and Small Business for the Indiana Economic Development Corporation, presented the Inflation Reduction Act Domestic Manufacturing Conversion grants.

Family and Social Services Administration

Secretary Mitch Roob and Kelly Mitchell, Director of the Division of Disability, Aging and Rehabilitation, presented the Medicaid State Plan Amendments. Senator Qaddoura asked to clarify changes to the

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pathways waiver and what the current waitlist of the pathways waiver is. Director Mitchell responded that there are some changes to correction of the reimbursement rate for home caregivers and the others would apply to all waivers to ensure consistently. Director Mitchell responded that the waitlist is sitting at around 11,700 people. Senator Qaddoura asked what clarifying services is intended to mean in the provided document. Director Mitchell responded that this means no changes in accessibility to services, just changes for clarity. Senator Qaddoura asked if FSSA's analysis showed any impact to quality of services to recipients. Director Mitchell noted that a positive impact to services was recognized, and increasing documentation standards has helped increase the quality of services provided. Senator Qaddoura asked what selective contracting intended to change in any processes, and Director Mitchell noted that this was only to limit the pool of providers. Senator Qaddoura asked if all waiver waitlist members had been vetted for necessity of service. Director Mitchell noted that was true. Secretary Roob noted a response in a couple weeks. Senator Qaddoura noted that he will reach out to qualifying health centers and organize a meeting between them and FSSA. Representative DeLaney asked about the indication that Indiana is relatively high on Medicaid spending and asked if Indiana was not on solid financial footing. Secretary Roob confirmed that the financial situation was not good before. Representative DeLaney noted that the agreement was to continue paying providers at the same rate between HIP 1.0 and HIP 2.0. Representative DeLaney asked if there were fewer people on Medicaid, Secretary Roob noted that they followed rules on the book and lowered the Medicaid enrollment based on eligibility. Senator Garten asked if the Biden administration handcuffed states by opening eligibility to people not eligible by law, and Secretary Roob stated that the decision was made to only maintain enrollment for people who qualified. Chairman Mishler asked if the number of enrollments is declining while cost per member is increasing. Secretary Roob stated that it is not proportional, and that FSSA would follow up with a chart demonstrating this.

State Budget Agency

Adam Alson, Director of the Office of Early Childhood and Out-of-School Learning for the Family and Social Services Administration, and Secretary Mitch Roob presented the Financial Responsibility and Opportunity Growth Fund Augmentation. Chairman Mishler asked if the waitlist had been audited for eligibility, and Secretary Roob confirmed. Senator Qaddoura asked about the wait list and if it is at the 135% federal poverty line and Director Alson confirmed the 135% federal poverty line. Representative DeLaney asked if the \$200 million augmentation is for 1 year. Secretary Roob confirmed that the 1-year timeline was decided by the General Assembly. Representative DeLaney asked why a childcare provider would want to take on more business when the provider rate is already not high enough. Director Alson clarified that the decision was made to increase enrollment with these State dollars. Director Chad Ranney noted that the administration does not take the request lightly and has full intentions of including sustainable funding for CCDF vouchers in the State budget. Senator Garten asked if the \$200 million ask was for the biennium or annually, Secretary Roob responded that it was annually. Senator Garten asked what that would bring total annual spend to, and Director Alson responded that the total spend would be increased from \$40 million to \$240 million. Senator Garten noted the additional waitlist and the total spend, with Secretary Roob confirming funding for the entire waitlist would be \$350 million, and that is extremely unlikely. Senator Garten asked for the top three childcare providers. Director Alson responded that was hard to answer, but there are some major providers throughout the State that would likely top the list. Senator Garten noted Indiana's overall 40th ranking in Childcare services. Senator Garten asked about the level of commitment to go to providers and negotiate a modernized regulatory environment with FSSA, and Secretary Roob reaffirmed the willingness to do so.

Indiana Economic Development Corporation

Josh Richardson, President of IEDC, presented the 21st Century Research and Technology Fund Investment Policies. Senator Qaddoura referred to the March 18th approval of the \$15 million Innovation Capital

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Program and asked who the recipient was. President Richardson noted that he would have to look at that and referred to subject matter experts alongside him. Senator Qaddoura noted that the Governor announced a \$15 million investment in Iron Nation and asked if that was the same \$15 million investment. President Richardson noted that was possible, but he was not sure without more information in front of him. Senator Qaddoura asked if the board approved on March 18th and the Governor announces three weeks later if the deal had been in the works for months. President Richardson noted that he was attempting to analyze the question and stated that was not considered in the policy updates presented at the business meeting. Senator Qaddoura noted that he was having trouble taking IEDC at their word and wanted to know what year IEDC could provide taxpayers with a timeline of when dollars are expected to come back to the State. President Richardson noted the complexities of working with private businesses, but that everyone involved in these deals have the interest of Hoosier taxpayers in mind. Senator Qaddoura noted the frustration of his constituents regarding deals made behind closed doors, and President Richardson responded stating that the IEDC could provide a timeline of the \$15 million investment confirmed on March 18th. Senator Qaddoura reiterated his frustration with IEDC and urged President Richardson to continue towards a path of transparency.


Josh Richardson, President of IEDC, presented Tax Credit Certifications.

Indiana Finance Authority

Jim McGoff, Public Finance Director of the Indiana Finance Authority, presented the Indiana Toll Road Lease Amendment. Representative DeLaney asked where the \$700 million figure in the presentation came from. Director McGoff responded that it came from negotiations. Representative DeLaney asked if that was a commitment made to support the infrastructure around the proposed stadium. Director McGoff responded that it was not and that it was instead a one-time payment for adjusting the toll road agreement. Representative DeLaney asked if there was an additional \$700 million for the seven affected counties, to which Director McGoff responded it was not. He further clarified stating that this was repayment for the \$700 million paid by the concessionaire, and that it could be used for infrastructure related to the stadium in the form of Lake and Porter counties implementing the taxes that come back to the IFA as repayment. Chairman Mishler asked if the IFA meetings were public meetings. Director McGoff responded yes, but that the public does not have an opportunity to speak at those meetings. Chairman Mishler noted that the new agreement allows the club to increase the amount twice a year and raises the floor for the cost of the project. Director McGoff confirmed that. Chairman Mishler noted that old policy dictated that toll road money had to be used in the county it is collected, but that changed in 2006. Chairman Mishler asked if SEA 27 reverted back to the original method. Director McGoff agreed with that statement.

Chairman Mishler asked if there were any motions to remove items from the agenda. Representative DeLaney, a voting alternate in the absence of Representative Gregory Porter, motioned to remove review item 7. There was no second to the motion, the motion failed. Chairman Mishler called for a motion to approve the agenda, Representative Thompson motioned and Senator David Niezgodski seconded the motion. The motion to approve the agenda carried unanimously. Chairman Mishler adjourned the meeting at 4:40 PM.

1. **Department of Administration (061)/State Budget Agency (057)** \$ 38,496,612
Preventive Maintenance Allocations FY2027

2. **Indiana State Police (100)** \$ 1,375,000
Roof Replacements

The Indiana State Police (ISP) is requesting funding for roof replacements at the following five facilities: Lafayette post, Peru post, the Lowell post, Bartholomew County fair building, and the Jackson County fair building. Roof ages range from 27 to 36 years, and all are past their useful life, showing signs of deterioration and water infiltration. These projects will include removal and disposal of the old roof and materials.

3. **Indiana State Police (100)** \$ 593,177
Sellersburg Post Rehabilitation

The Indiana State Police (ISP) is requesting funding for the rehabilitation of the Sellersburg post. The facility has been in operation for more than 45 years, has reached the end of its useful life. This project will include new floor coverings, wall coverings, soundproofing interview room walls, ceiling tile replacement, furniture upgrades, and technology upgrades.

4. **Indiana State Police (100)** \$ 593,177
Cyber Crimes Building Rehabilitation

The Indiana State Police (ISP) is requesting funding for the rehabilitation of the Cyber Crimes Building at the District 52 complex in Indianapolis. The facility has been in operation for more than 45 years, has reached the end of its useful life. This project will include new floor coverings, wall coverings, soundproofing interview room walls, ceiling tile replacement, furniture upgrades, and technology upgrades.

5. **Indiana Law Enforcement Academy (103)** \$ 1,742,987
Shooting Range Renovation

The Indiana Law Enforcement Academy (ILEA) is seeking funding to renovate the existing shooting range. The renovation will include the installation of a horizontal ricochet capturing system which will expand training capacity and allow simultaneous use of both the range and the Emergency Vehicle Operations (EVO) track. This improvement will help ILEA better meet training demands and enhance the overall efficiency of officer preparation.

6. **Adjutant General’s Office (110)** \$ 476,000
Lafayette Boiler System Replacement

The Adjutant General’s Office is requesting a change of use of funds for the replacement of two boiler systems at the Lafayette Armory. The existing 19-year-old and 31-year-old boiler systems provide service to the 136,720 facility and are experiencing elevated preventive maintenance costs due to recurring failure. The replacement systems will be modular boiler system which will increase energy efficiency and restore consistent service to the legacy armory.

7. **Adjutant General’s Office (110)** \$ 940,000
Warsaw Armory Utility Extension

The Adjutant General’s Office (AGO) is requesting additional funding for the conversion of the Warsaw Armory to public water and sewer. Initial design work has revealed additional connection points and obstacles which has led to the increase in overall project cost. The project will include the demolition of the existing water well, service extension, and connection to public water and sewer. Replacement of the existing 68-year-old well and septic system will allow for improved water quality and will extend the life of fixtures and steam boilers at the legacy armory.

8. **Department of Natural Resources (300)** \$ 1,598,474
Falls of the Ohio Educational Pavilion

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Division of State Parks is seeking approval to construct the Falls of the Ohio Educational Pavilion. The completed structure will include restroom facilities for park visitors and will be utilized for programs and events accommodating up to 90 people. The space will be multipurpose; however, the most anticipated use is by large field trips visiting the park. Private funds are being donated by the Falls of the Ohio Foundation.

9. **Indiana State Museum and Historic Sites (303)** \$ 14,460,000
Whitewater Canal Comprehensive Preservation Project

The Indiana State Museum and Historic Sites (ISMHS) requests funding for repair and rehabilitation at the Whitewater Canal State Historic Site. The project will include the replacement of the canal boat and the rehabilitation of the canal bed, Laurel Feeder Dam, Locks 24 and 25, and the Duck Creek Aqueduct. The rehabilitation work will include the stabilization of various structures, masonry work, gate swing and arm replacements, reconstruction of walkways, and accessibility improvements.

10. **Indiana State Museum and Historic Sites (303)** \$ 780,000
New Harmony Community House Moisture Mitigation

The Indiana State Museum and Historic Sites (ISMHS) requests funding to address moisture infiltration to one of the 200-year-old Community Houses at the New Harmony State Historic Site. The existing roof and gutters have reached the end of their useful life and are not protecting and draining the structure properly. Community House two is a total of 11,070 square feet with three levels of venue hosting capabilities. This project will include a new roof installation, new gutters, and street level rainwater runoff corrections through a below-grade drainage system.

11. **Indiana State Museum and Historic Sites (303)** \$ 420,000
Angel Mounds Visitor Center Panel Replacement and Moisture Mitigation

The Indiana State Museum and Historic Sites (ISMHS) requests funding to address moisture infiltration at the 5,000 square foot Angel Mounds Visitor Center. The exterior metal panels lack a waterproof membrane to keep water from infiltrating in the building, leading to water damage throughout the structure. The caulking done around the panels is past its useful life and leaks are becoming increasingly more severe. The existing panels will be replaced with a more appropriate roofing system. The existing Visitor Center was constructed in 1971 with an addition in 2001.

12. **Board of Animal Health (351)** \$ 686,677
Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (ADDL) Equipment

The Board of Animal Health (BOAH), on behalf of the Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (ADDL), requests the release of repair and rehabilitation funds for the replacement of toxicology equipment and thermocyclers in the molecular diagnostics section. The current toxicology instrument is 12 years old and has exceeded its useful life. This instrument requires increasing maintenance needs and experiences prolonged downtime, slowing down laboratory efficiency. The molecular diagnostics section currently operates six thermocyclers purchased around 10 years ago. The manufacturer is no longer making this model, and all vendor service agreements and replacement parts will no longer be available.

13. **Indiana Correctional Industries (515)** \$ 449,004
Commissary Forklift Truck Replacements

Indiana Correctional Industries is requesting funding for the replacement of six forklift trucks. All forklift trucks were purchased in 2004 for use in the commissary warehouse, and they have reached the end of their useful life. Recent repairs include battery replacements, hydraulic work, and electrical work. The type of forklifts used will change for efficiency purposes, and acquisition costs have decreased as a result. The new forklifts are expected to last 5 to 7 years.

14. **Department of Correction – Correctional Industrial Facility (635)** \$ 477,662
Secure Housing Entry Doors

The Indiana Department of Correction (DOC) requests funding for 16 new double-front doors at Housing Units at the Correctional Industrial Facility. The existing 2-inch-thick steel doors, installed in 1985, are at the end of their useful life. The rust and swelling at the bottom of the door frames has caused a complete separation from the wall in various locations. The new doors are expected to last at least 30 years.

15. **Department of Correction – Plainfield Correctional Facility (690)** \$ 1,400,000
Individual Housing Unit Door Replacement

The Indiana Department of Correction (DOC) is requesting funding to replace 84 doors in the Individual Housing Unit at Plainfield Correctional Facility. This unit contains high security sliding doors that are original to the 1982 construction. The new doors are expected to last 30 years. The lock and key series used have been discontinued and the existing door locks are at the end of their useful life.

16. **Department of Correction – Plainfield Correctional Facility (690)** \$ 1,394,160
West and Central Dormitory Roof Replacement

The Indiana Department of Correction (DOC) is requesting funding for the replacement of the roof at both the West and Central dormitories at Plainfield Correctional Facility. Both roofs are original to the building's construction in 1991, and each dorm is 19,689 square feet. Both facilities have water infiltration and membrane shrinkage, causing further damage. This project will include removal and disposal of the existing roof and insulation down to the roof deck. The new roof is expected to last 30 years.

17. **Department of Transportation (800)** \$ 350,000
Indianapolis Subdistrict Salt Building Prewash Pit

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) is requesting funding for the construction of a stage one prewash pit in the existing Indianapolis subdistrict salt building. The existing salt building does not have a prewash pit, which hinders INDOT's operational needs. Currently, when a truck is washed the water contaminated with salt and dirt is not contained, putting neighboring properties at risk. A stage one prewash pit would allow for proper cleaning of INDOT trucks and will treat the contaminated water making it available for recycled use. Recycled water can be used to make brine, further reducing operational impact for INDOT.

18. **Department of Transportation (800)** \$ 4,750,000
Salt Dome Concrete Wall Repairs

The Department of Transportation (INDOT) is requesting funding for concrete wall repairs at 19 different salt domes around the State. Locations will include Newport, Romney, Loud/Columbia City, Warsaw, Kokomo, Rushville, Shelbyville, LaPorte, Medaryville, Rochester, Winamac, Amity, Bloomington, Brownstown, North Vernon, Penntown, Versailles, Princeton, and Poseyville. Salt infiltration has caused corrosion of the steel reinforcement bars over time. This project will reinforce the concrete walls and further their useful life. All loose concrete will be replaced to ensure safety standards are met at all facilities.

The Purdue Board of Trustees requests approval to renovate the Roberts Impact Lab's first floor at Purdue Northwest. The approximately 13,000 GSF first-floor interior will be demolished and renovated to reconfigure space and accommodate current needs, resulting in space for two quantum computing labs, classrooms, collaboration spaces, and additional meeting spaces. New air handlers, a chiller, and a generator will also be installed to support the first-floor initiatives. The Roberts Impact Lab will host advanced manufacturing labs, makerspaces, scientific research and development facilities, and collaboration zones that will be overseen by Purdue Northwest faculty. The lab will strengthen the local and regional economy by attracting new businesses and fostering job creation. Within five years, this facility and the initiatives it supports are anticipated to create 150-300 direct and indirect jobs and catalyze more than \$100 million in the regional economy.

The renovation of the building will consist of an elevator refurbishment and a complete upgrade of the HVAC system including a new chiller, new air handling units, upgraded building controls, associated plumbing/electrical and required finish upgrades. The project will improve air quality, HVAC controls and comfort, helping to maintain Clark Hall as a desirable housing option for University students.
