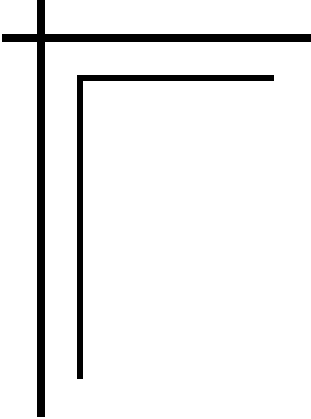

In our opinion, Pile CPAs prepared the audit report in accordance with the guidelines established by the State Board of Accounts.

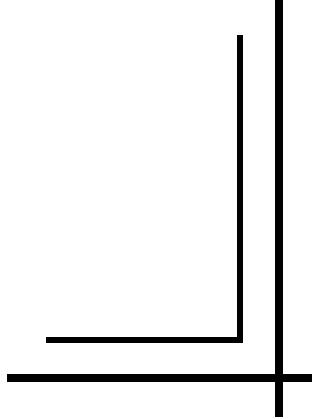

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinions

We have audited the financial statements of ProKids, Inc. (the "Organization"), which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2022 and 2021, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Organization as of June 30, 2022 and 2021, and the changes in its net assets and cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAS") and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards (Government Auditing Standards)*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Organization and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern for 12 months beyond the date of this report.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements - continued

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards*, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matters

Our audits were conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards, as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations ("CFR") Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements.

Other Matters - continued

The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated August 25, 2022, on our consideration of the Organization's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Organization's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

NOTE 1 NATURE OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Business

ProKids, Inc. (the "Organization") was formed to develop, implement, and manage intra-agency programs, identified by Part C of the Individuals With Disabilities Education Act ("IDEA") legislation, in order to provide early intervention services to eligible infants and toddlers (birth to three years of age) with disabilities and their families. In the State of Indiana, this Part C program is called First Steps.

The goals of the First Steps Program in Indiana are to find and identify eligible children who are developmentally delayed; to provide assessment/evaluation of development for referred children to determine eligibility; to assist children to transition into other appropriate programs, once the child is three years of age and/or no longer eligible; to teach families to be advocates for their child's needs; and to provide appropriate developmental interventions so as to decrease the need for ongoing Special Education Services.

The Organization is the Fiscal Agent for the Local Planning and Coordinating Council ("LPCC") and the System Point of Entry ("SPOE") for the Indiana First Steps Program in Marion, Hamilton, Hendricks, Johnson, Morgan and Tipton counties ("Central Indiana Cluster G").

- *Local Planning and Coordinating Councils* - The purpose of these grants is to provide funding for Marion, Hamilton, Hendricks, Johnson, Morgan and Tipton counties to do public awareness, child find, transition, education, and other activities that enhance the early intervention program in each county. The Organization provides fiscal agent services, through cost reimbursement, to administer these funds for each of the above counties.
- *System Point of Entry* - The purpose of these grants is to provide funding to receive referrals from Marion, Hamilton, Hendricks, Johnson, Morgan and Tipton counties for children who are suspected of having developmental delays or who are at risk for developmental delays due to their medical condition or other biological risk factors; to initiate the evaluation process; and to determine whether eligibility criteria have been met. The Organization provides fiscal agent services, through cost reimbursement and fee for service, to administer these funds for each of the above counties.

A summary of the Organization's significant accounting policies are as follows:

A. Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

B. Basis of Presentation

These financial statements have been prepared to focus on the entity as a whole and to present transactions according to the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

B. Basis of Presentation - continued

This has been done by classification of fund transactions and balances into two categories of net assets:

Net Assets without donor restrictions: These net assets generally result from revenues generated by receiving contributions that have no donor restrictions, providing services, and receiving interest from operating investments, less expenses incurred in providing program-related services, raising contributions, and performing administrative functions.

Net Assets with donor restrictions: These net assets result from gifts of cash and other assets that are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets, either temporarily or permanently, until the donor restriction expires, that is until the stipulated time restriction ends or the purpose of the restriction is accomplished, the net assets are restricted.

C. Cash

Cash consists of one checking account with a financial institution. The account is partially insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. The balances, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. To date, there have been no losses on such accounts.

D. Concentration of Credit Risk

Federal funding by Indiana Family and Social Services Administration, Division of Disability and Rehabilitative Services ("State of Indiana") accounted for greater than 95% of total revenue received by the Organization for 2022 and 2021. The funding is derived from reimbursable grants and a fee for service contract to carry out the mission and programs of the Organization.

E. Grants Receivable

Grants receivable consists of grant revenue expected to be received shortly after year-end. Management considers grants receivable at June 30, 2022 and 2021, to be fully collectible; accordingly, no allowance for doubtful accounts is required.

F. Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost. The Organization capitalizes assets with a value greater than \$500 and an estimated useful life of three or more years. Property and equipment are considered to be owned by the Organization; however, state funding sources may maintain equitable interest in the property purchased by grant monies, as well as the right to determine the use of any proceeds from the sale of these assets. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Estimated useful lives for software, furniture, and equipment range from 3 to 10 years and leasehold improvements for 10 years or the life of the lease.

Depreciation in the amount of \$53,405 and \$52,052 has been allocated to program services and supporting activities in the statements of activities for the years ended June 30, 2022 and 2021, respectively.

G. Support and Revenues

The Organization receives support from private contributions and grants, and recognizes this support when cash or an unconditional promise to give is received. Conditional promises to give - that is, those with a measurable performance or other barrier and a right of return - are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been met. Contributions and grants recognized are recorded as net assets without donor restrictions or net assets with donor restrictions depending upon the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions.

The Organization reports gifts of cash and other assets as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated amounts. When a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is satisfied, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statements of activities as net assets released from restriction. Support and revenue with donor-imposed restrictions which are met in the same reporting period are reported as net assets without donor restrictions in the statement of activities.

A portion of the Organization's revenue is derived from cost-reimbursable federal and state contracts and grants, which are conditioned upon certain performance requirements and/or the incurrence of allowable qualifying expenses. Amounts received are recognized as revenue when the Organization has incurred expenditures in compliance with specific contract or grant provisions. Amounts received prior to incurring qualifying expenditures are reported as deferred revenue in the statement of financial position. Grant expenditures are subject to audit and acceptance by the granting agency, and adjustments could be required as a result of such audit. Management believes that any liability for reimbursements which may arise as a result of these audits would not be material.

H. Income Taxes

The Organization is exempt from federal and state income taxes on its related activities under Internal Revenue Service Code Section 501(c)(3). Accordingly, no provision for federal and state income taxes has been made.

The Organization files the required federal and state information returns. Whenever tax returns are filed, the filing organization must evaluate the merits of its tax positions and determine if they will be ultimately sustained. Those tax positions for the Organization include maintaining their tax-exempt status and the taxability of any unrelated business income. The Organization believes these positions are sustainable. Although the Organization has not incurred any interest and penalties associated with these positions, it is their policy to expense them in the statement of activities.

I. Functional Expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

J. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

On January 30, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the coronavirus outbreak a "Public Health Emergency of International Concern" and on March 10, 2020, declared it to be a pandemic. Actions taken around the world to help mitigate the spread of the coronavirus include restrictions on travel, and quarantines in certain areas, and forced closures for certain types of public places and businesses. The coronavirus and actions taken to mitigate it have had and are expected to continue to have an adverse impact on the economies and financial markets of many countries, including the geographical area in which the Organization operates. It is unknown how long these conditions will last and what the complete financial effect will be to the organization. Our concentrations due to grantor or contributor; concentrated revenue from particular programs, services or fund-raising events; and the market or geographic area in which the Organization conducts operations make it reasonably possible that we are vulnerable to the risk of a near-term severe impact.

Additionally, it is reasonably possible that estimates made in the financial statements have been, or will be, materially and adversely impacted in the near term as a result of these conditions.

K. Reclassification

Certain amounts from the prior year have been reclassified to conform with the current year presentation.

L. Evaluation of Subsequent Events

The Organization has evaluated subsequent events through August 25, 2022, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 2 RECENTLY ISSUED ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

In February 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") issued Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") 2016-02, Leases. The standard requires all leases with lease terms over 12 months to be capitalized as a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability on the statement of financial position at the date of the lease commencement. Leases will be classified as either finance or operating, and this distinction will be relevant for the pattern of expense recognition in the statement of activities. This standard will be effective for the entity for the year ending June 30, 2023. The Organization is currently in the process of evaluating the effect of adoption of this ASU on its financial statements.

In September 2020, the FASB issued ASU 2020-07, Presentation and Disclosures by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets. The standard will improve transparency in the reporting of contributed nonfinancial assets, also known as gifts in-kind, for not-for-profit organizations. The ASU requires a not-for-profit organization to present contributed nonfinancial assets as a separate line item in the statement of activities, apart from contributions of cash or other financial assets, along with expanded disclosure requirements. This standard will be effective for the organization for the year ending June 30, 2023. The Organization does not expect this ASU to have a significant impact on the Organization's financial statements.

NOTE 3 LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY

The following table reflects financial assets as of June 30, 2022 and 2021, reduced by amounts that are not available to meet general expenditures within one year of the statement of financial position date, due to donor or contractual restrictions. Currently, the Organization does not have donor or other contractual restrictions that make them unavailable for general expenditures within one year of the statement of financial position.

For purposes of analyzing resources available to meet general expenditures over a 12 month period, the Organization considers all expenditures related to its ongoing program and support activities to be general expenditures.

The Organization has a \$9.7 million reimbursement grant available over two years to meet cash needs for general expenditures. Year ending June 30, 2022 was year one of the two-year grant cycle. The grant is subject to time restrictions but is expected to be collected with the next 12 months. The Organization also had a \$350,000 line of credit, which it could draw upon in the event of an unanticipated liquidity need. In May 2022 the Organization increased the line of credit to \$400,000. The Organization's financial health and liquidity is monitored through regular reporting to the Board of Directors.

NOTE 4 LINE OF CREDIT

The Organization had a line of credit with National Bank of Indianapolis with a maximum debt facility of \$350,000 available through January 11, 2022. On May 2, 2022, the Organization entered a new line of credit agreement with an increased maximum debt facility of \$400,000 available through May 1, 2023. Amounts borrowed are secured by a commercial security agreement securing all assets of the Organization. The amount borrowed under the line of credit was \$0 as of June 30, 2022 and 2021. Interest is assessed at the lender's prime rate plus 0.25%, but not less than 4.50%. The effective rate at June 30, 2022 and 2021 was 5.00% and 4.50%, respectively.

NOTE 5 LONG-TERM DEBT

On April 15, 2020, the Organization signed and received a \$890,700 loan under the Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP") created as part of the relief efforts related to COVID-19 and administered by the Small Business Administration. The loan accrues interest at 1.00%, but payments are not required to begin until October 15, 2020. The Organization is eligible for loan forgiveness of up to 100% of the loan, upon meeting certain requirements. The loan is uncollateralized and is fully guaranteed by the Federal government.

The Organization determined it was not eligible for forgiveness, and the funds were fully paid back as of June 30, 2022.

NOTE 6 LEASE COMMITMENTS

In March 2018, the Organization signed an office lease at a new location with a lease term of ninety-four months that expires February 2026. The Organization received the first four months free with monthly payments escalating over the life of the lease.

The Organization is obligated under two operating leases for a postage machine and a copier with monthly payments ranging from \$175 to \$420 and various expiration dates through July 2025. Subsequent to year-end, the Organization signed a new postage machine lease through October 2027.

NOTE 7 EMPLOYEE BENEFIT PLAN

The Organization has established a 403(b) Defined Contribution Retirement Plan (the "Plan"). An employee is eligible to make elective deferrals without a service requirement, unless they are part of an excluded class described in the Plan Adoption Agreement.

Eligible classes of employees are all employees except Casual Employees who are hired to work on an as needed basis from time to time and normally work 0-19 hours per week; provided, however, that a Casual Employee who attains age 21 and completes one year of eligibility service will be eligible to become a participant for purposes of becoming a contributing participant (and thus eligible to make elective deferrals) on the first day of the next Plan Year, but not more than six months after satisfaction of this criteria. To be eligible for employer contributions, an employee must be at least 21 years of age and complete 12 consecutive months of eligibility service. Plan contributions are invested at the discretion of each participant and are fully vested and non-forfeitable when such contributions are made.

Plan contributions are made at a discretionary rate set by the Board of Directors each year. The discretionary rate for fiscal years June 30, 2022 and 2021 was 2%. Retirement plan contributions were \$84,261 and \$89,297 for the years ended June 30, 2022 and 2021, respectively.

NOTE 1 BASIS OF PRESENTATION
