Report on the Financial Statements

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the business-type activities of the Housing Authority of the City of Brazil (Authority), Indiana, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2018, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Authority's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, I express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

Opinion

In my opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the business-type activities of the Housing Authority of the City of Brazil, Indiana, as of December 31, 2018, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management’s discussion and analysis on pages i-vii be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. I have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management’s responses to my inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge I obtained during my audit of the basic financial statements. I do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide me with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

My audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Housing Authority of the City of Brazil, Indiana’s basic financial statements. The accompanying PHA’s Statement of Certification of Actual Modernization Costs and the Financial Data Schedule are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by Title 2 U.S. *Code of Federal Regulations* (CFR) Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards*, and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The accompanying PHA’s Statement of Certification of Actual Modernization Costs, the Financial Data Schedule and the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In my opinion, the accompanying PHA’s Statement of Certification of Actual Modernization Costs, the Financial Data Schedule and the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, I have also issued my report dated June 5, 2019, on my consideration of the Housing Authority of the City of Brazil, Indiana’s internal control over financial reporting and on my tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of my testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Housing Authority of the City of Brazil, Indiana’s internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

As management of the Housing Authority of the City of Brazil, we offer the readers of the Authority's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Authority for the year ended December 31, 2018. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with the Authority's financial statements.

Overview of the Financial Statements

The financial statements included in this annual audit report are those of a special-purpose government engaged in a business-type activity. The following statements are included:

The Statement of Net Position

This statement reports all financial and capital resources for the Authority. The statement is presented in the format where assets minus liabilities, equals "Net Position", formerly known as Net Asset or Equity.

Statement of Revenue, Expenses, and Change in Net Position

This statement reports the Authority's operating and non-operating revenue, by major sources, along with operating and non-operating expenses and capital contributions.

Statement of Cash Flows

Presents information on the effects changes in assets and liabilities have on cash during the course of the Fiscal Year.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the entity-wide financial statements.

Analysis of the Housing Authority

Our analysis of the Authority as a whole begins on the next page. The most important question asked about the Authorities finances is "Is the Authority as a whole better or worse off as a result of the year's activities?"

The attached analysis of entity wide net position, revenues, and expenses are provided to assist with answering the above question. This analysis includes all assets and liabilities using the accrual basis of accounting. Accrual accounting recognizes revenues and expenses when earned regardless of when cash is received or paid.

Our analysis also presents the Authority's Net Position and changes in them. One can think of the Authority's net position as the difference between what the Authority own's (assets) to what the Authority owes (liabilities). The change in net position analysis will assist the reader with measuring the health or financial position of the Authority. To fully assess the financial health of any Authority the reader must also consider other non-financial factors such as changes in family composition, fluctuations in the local economy, HUD mandated program administrative changes, and the physical condition of the Authorities capital assets.

To fully understand the financial statements of the Housing Authority, one must start with an understanding of what the Authority actually does. The following is a brief description of the programs and services that the Authority provides for the residents of the City of Brazil:

Low Income Public Housing (LIPH)

The Housing Authority has 288 units at 4 sites in its Public Housing inventory. The Authority is responsible for the management, maintenance, and utilities for all units. On an annual basis, the Authority submits a request for funding known as the Calculation of Operating Fund Subsidy.

The basic concept of the Calculation of Operating Subsidy is that the Authority has an allowable and an allowable utility expense level. HUD funds the difference between allowable costs as incurred for all leased units and the actual tenant revenue generated.

Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers (HCV)

HUD has contracted with the Housing Authority to manage the Housing Choice Voucher Program. The Authority pays a Housing Assistance Payments to Landlords for Low Income tenants.

The Housing Assistance Payment matches the difference between the total rent that the Landlord can charge, at or below a fair market rent amount supplied by HUD, and the amount that the tenant can pay. For each unit that the Authority administers, HUD pays the Authority an administrative fee. The Housing Authority is not responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of the units and properties associated with this program.

Capital Fund Program

These grant programs are award by HUD on an annual basis. The purpose of these grants is to improve the sites and units of the Authority. The Authority requisitions funds from HUD as the Authority expends funds.

State and Local Grants (Kruzan Street Rental Properties)

The Housing Authority was given two properties (516 and 522 W. Kruzan St., Brazil IN) by the City of Brazil in January 2011. The two homes were newly constructed under the Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP).

The Housing Authority assumed all rights and responsibilities of these properties and must ensure the units are rented to families that meet the income qualifications of NSP Round 1 (at or below fifty percent of the area median income). The Authority also agrees to:

- (1) ensure units meet standards set forth in 24CFR 92.251;
- (2) ensure that families who rent the units meet the affordability requirements;
- (3) comply with NSP published rent limits; and
- (4) comply with annual reporting requirements.

Condensed Comparative Financial Statements

Analysis of Entity Wide Net Position (Statement of Net Position)

Total Net Position for FY 2018 was \$4,425,529 and for FY 2017 the amount was \$4,601,506. This represents an overall decrease of \$175,977, or 4.0%. Details are as follows:

Cash, including short term investments, increased by \$97,655 from FY 2017 to FY 2018 or 17.2%. The change in the Authority's cash balance is due primarily to increases in unrestricted cash investments from the results of current year operations.

Other Current Assets decreased by \$173,108. The Authority received cash during FY 2018 for a HUD Capital Fund receivable recognized in FY 2017.

Capital Assets decreased to \$5,417,282 in FY 2018 from \$5,712,660 in FY 2017, or by \$295,378, or 5.2%. The change in Capital Assets will be presented in the section of this analysis entitled Analysis of Capital Assets.

Current Liabilities decreased by \$205,120 or 49.4%. The Authority paid accruals recognized in FY 2017 during FY 2018, including Capital Fund expenditure and energy improvements financing.

Non-Current Liabilities increased \$10,266. The current and noncurrent portions of long-term debt for financing energy improvements was adjusted based on the remaining future payments schedule.

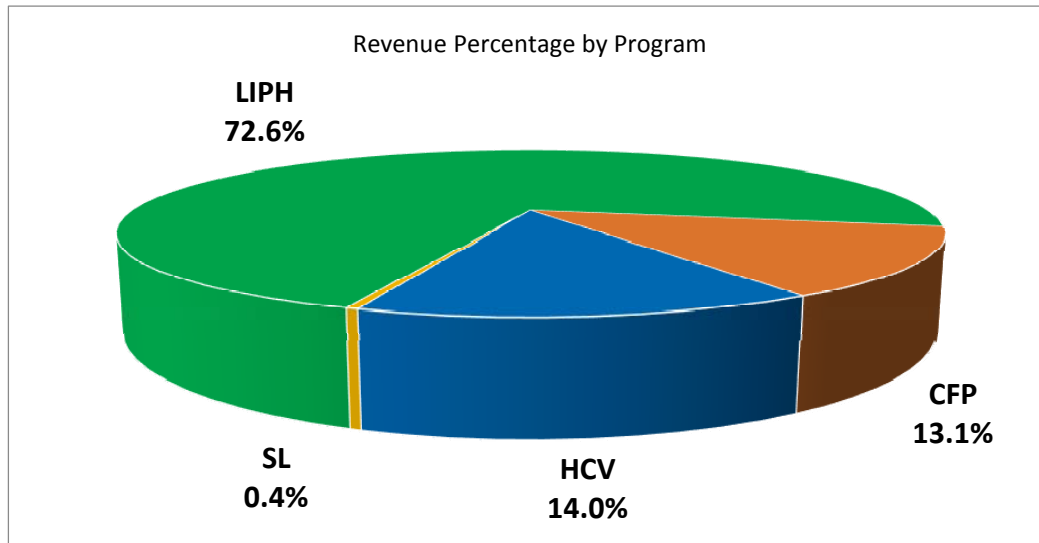

The diagram below illustrates the percentage of revenues generated by the programs as presented above for Fiscal Year Ending December 31, 2018:



Total revenues for FY 2018 were \$2,623,578, as compared to \$2,268,143 of total revenues for FY 2017. Comparatively, FY 2018 revenues exceeded FY 2017 revenues by \$355,435, or 15.7%. Primarily, this change in total revenues is reflective of increase in other revenue (insurance proceeds).

Analysis of Entity Wide Expenditures

Total Expenditures for FY 2018 were \$2,799,555, as compared to \$2,214,986 for FY 2017. This reflects a decrease of \$584,569, or 26.4%.

Administrative expenditures for FY 2018 were \$407,303 as compared to \$429,983 in FY 2017. This represents a decrease of \$22,680, or 5.3%. This net change is primarily due to decreases in administrative salaries.

Tenant expenditures increased by of \$7,986, or 13.6%. The major cause for this change is due to increases in costs of the services provided to tenants.

Utilities expenditures decreased by of \$3,965, or 1.4%. The expenses paid for water, electricity, sewer and gas decreased as compared to the prior year. The decrease was offset by utility contract for monitoring and verification of the energy performance contract.

Maintenance expenditures increased by \$49,550, or 11.2%. The main cause for this change was an increase in maintenance labor and maintenance materials.

General expenditures, including insurance increased by \$20,001, or 11.2%. The main reason for this change is due to increases in property insurance costs and tenant bad debts.

Casualty losses of \$372,712 were recognized during the fiscal year and were offset by insurance proceeds revenue to pay for fire damages at Meridian Towers.

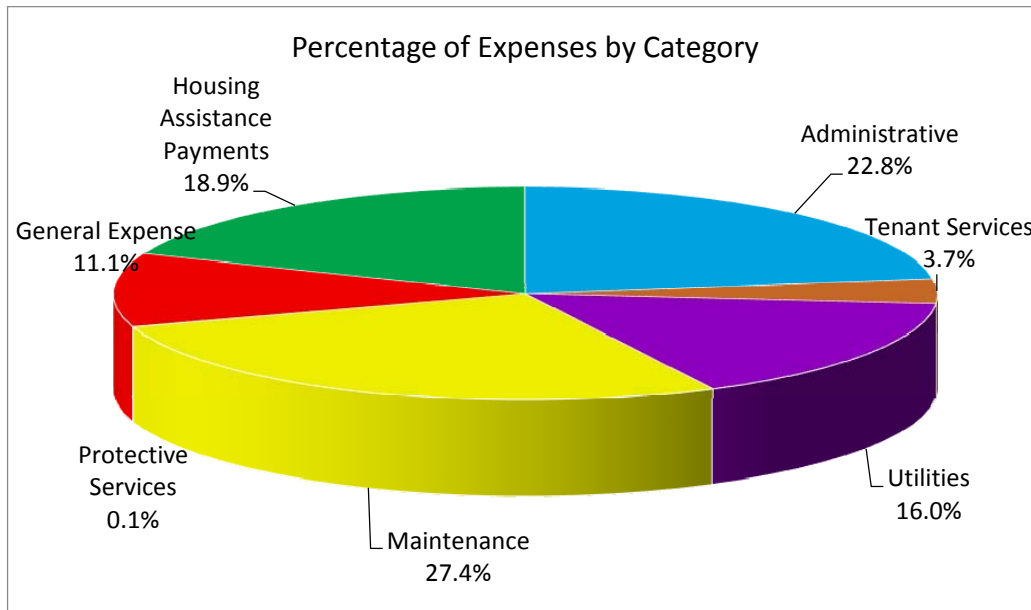

During FY 2018, Total Capital Assets increased by \$176,053. The increase to Total Capital Assets included roof repairs and replacements, sealing of lots and driveways, fire alarm installations and boiler replacement. After applying the depreciation expense for the year in the amount of \$573,517, Net Capital Assets decreased \$295,378, or 5.2%.

1B. Basis of Presentation - (Continued)

The Authority operates the following programs in the enterprise fund:

Low Rent - The objective of the program is to provide decent, safe and sanitary housing and related facilities for eligible low-income individuals.

Capital Fund Program - The purpose of this program is to provide funds annually to housing authorities for the modernization of the housing development and for management improvements.

Housing Choice Vouchers - The objective of the program is to help low-income families obtain decent, safe, and sanitary housing through a system of rental assistance. HUD reimburses the Authority for the rental supplements paid to private landlords and the administrative costs of managing the program.

State & Local – The Authority manages two properties received from the City of Brazil in January 2011. The two homes were constructed under the Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP). The Authority assumed all rights and responsibilities of these properties and must ensure the units are rented to families that meet the income qualifications of NSP round 1 (at or below 50% of area median income).

1C. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

Measurement focus is a term used to describe “which” transactions are recorded within the various financial statements. Basis of accounting refers to “when” transactions are recorded regardless of the measurement focus applied.

Measurement Focus - The proprietary fund utilizes an “economic resources” measurement focus. The accounting objectives of this measurement focus are the determination of operating income, changes in net position (or cost recovery), financial position, and cash flows. All assets and liabilities (whether current or non-current) associated with their activities are reported. Proprietary fund equity is classified as net position.

Basis of Accounting - In the financial statements, the proprietary fund utilizes the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recorded when the liability is incurred or economic asset used.

1D. Budgets

Budgets are prepared for regulatory purposes in accordance with the Authority’s contract with HUD on an annual basis for all operating programs and on a project length basis for capital projects funds which are approved by the Board of Commissioners and submitted to HUD for their approval, if required.

1E. Estimates and assumptions

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could vary from those estimates.

1F. Assets, Liabilities and Equity

Cash and Investments

For the purpose of the Statement of Net Position, “cash and cash equivalents” includes all demand, savings accounts, and certificates of deposits or short-term investments with an original maturity of three months or less. For the purpose of the Statement of Cash Flows, “cash and cash equivalents” include all demand and savings accounts, and certificates of deposit or short-term investments with an original maturity of three months or less.

Investments are carried at fair value except for short-term U.S. Treasury obligations, if any, with a remaining maturity at the time of purchase of one year or less. Those investments, if any, are reported at amortized cost. Fair value is based on quoted market price. Additional cash and investment disclosures are presented in Notes 2B and 3A.

Inter-fund Receivables and Payables

During the course of operations, numerous transactions occur within individual funds that may result in amounts owed between funds. Inter-fund receivables and payables between funds are eliminated for financial statement presentation.

Receivables

Receivables consist of all revenues earned at year-end and not yet received. Allowances for uncollectible accounts receivable are based upon historical trends and the periodic aging of accounts receivable. Major receivable balances consist of tenants accounts receivable, HUD, fraud recovery and miscellaneous receivables.

Inventories

Inventories are valued at lower of cost or market on an average cost basis. Inventories consist primarily of maintenance materials and supplies held for consumption. The consumption method is used to account for inventories. Under the consumption method, inventories are recorded as assets when purchased and expenses when used.

Fixed Assets

Fixed assets in the proprietary fund types are stated at historical cost, or estimated historical cost if actual is unavailable, except for donated fixed assets which are recorded at their estimated fair value at the date of donation. It is the policy of the Authority to capitalize all assets with a cost of \$500 or greater. The cost of maintenance and repairs are charged to operations as incurred. Costs of major additions, improvements, and betterments are capitalized.

Fixed Assets - (Continued)

Depreciation of all exhaustible fixed assets is charged as an expense against operations and is recorded in the Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Position with accumulated depreciation reflected in the Statement of Net Position. Depreciation is provided over the assets estimated useful lives using the straight-line method of depreciation. The range of estimated useful lives by type of asset is as follows:

Building	15-40 years
Furniture, equipment and machinery - dwelling	10 years
Furniture, equipment and machinery - administrative	5-10 years

Restricted Assets

Restricted assets include cash of the proprietary fund that are legally restricted as to their use. The primary restricted asset is related to the security deposit fund under the Low Rent and State & Local program.

Compensated Absences

The Authority's policies regarding vacation time does not permit employees to carry forward unused vacation leave. As such, no liability is recorded at year end.

Equity Classifications

Equity is classified as net position and displayed in two components:

1) Net investment in capital assets - Consists of capital assets including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowing that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.

2) Unrestricted net position - All other net position that do not meet the definition of "restricted" or "net investment in capital assets."

1G. Revenues, Expenditures, and Expenses

Operating Revenues and Expenses

Operating revenues and expenses are those that result from providing services and delivering goods and/or services. It also includes all revenue and expenses not related to capital and related financing, non-capital financing, or investing activities.

Inter-fund Transfers

Permanent reallocation of resources between programs of the reporting entity is classified as inter-fund transfers. For the purposes of the Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Change in Net Position, all inter-fund transfers between individual programs, if any, have been eliminated.

NOTE 2 – STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE AND ACCOUNTABILITY

2B. Deposits and Investments Laws and Regulations

It is the Authority's policy for deposits to be secured by collateral valued at market or par, whichever is lower, less the amount of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) insurance. As reflected in Note 3A, all deposits were fully insured or collateralized.

Investing is performed in accordance with HUD regulations and State Statutes. Funds may be invested in the following type of investments:

- Direct obligations of the U.S. Government pledged by its full faith and credit.
- Demand, savings, money-market and certificates of deposit at commercial banks, mutual savings banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions provided that the entire deposit be insured by the FDIC and any deposits in excess of insured amounts are adequately collateralized.

2C. Revenue Restrictions

The Authority has various restrictions placed over certain revenue sources. The primary restricted revenue sources include:

Deposits

Custodial Credit Risk - Deposits

The custodial credit risk for *deposits* is the risk that, in the event of the failure of a depository financial institution, the Authority will not be able to recover deposits or will not be able to recover collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. At December 31, 2018, the Authority's bank balances of \$363,842 were entirely covered by FDIC insurance or by the Public Deposit Insurance Fund (PDIF) which was created in 1937 to protect the public funds of the state and its political subdivisions deposited in approved financial institutions in the state of Indiana. The PDIF insures those public funds deposited in approved financial institutions which exceed the limits of coverage provided by federal deposit insurance. The fund is administered by the Indiana Board for Depositories.

Custodial Credit Risk - Investments

The custodial credit risk for *investments* is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the Authority will not be able to recover the value of its investment or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. At December 31, 2018, the Authority's investment balance of \$356,160 was entirely covered by FDIC and PDIF insurance.

Interest Rate Risk

The Authority does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

Credit Risk

State law limits investment in commercial paper, corporate bonds, and mutual bond funds to the top two ratings issued by nationally recognized statistical rating organization. As the Authority's investments consist entirely of certificate of deposits, credit risk is not applicable to the Housing Authority.

4A. Employee Pension Plan

The Authority provides pension benefits for all of its full-time employees through a defined contribution plan (401a) with Billings & Company. The Plan administrator has complete control of the administration of the plan, including complete discretions to interpret or construe the provisions of the Plan and under which contributions are established or may be amended.

In a defined contribution plan, benefits depend solely on amounts contributed to the plan plus investment earnings. The plan requires the Authority to contribute 7.5% and employees 5.5% of covered wages. Benefits are fully vested at the end of 5 years of service.

4B. Risk Management

4F. Subsequent Events

Subsequent events, which provide evidence about conditions that existed after the balance sheet date, require disclosure in the accompanying notes. Management evaluated the activity of the Authority through June 5, 2019 and concluded that no subsequent events have occurred that would require adjustment to or disclosures within these financial statements.

4G. Economic Dependency

The Authority is primarily dependent upon HUD for the funding of operations; therefore, the Authority is affected more by the federal budget than by local economic conditions. The funding of programs could be significantly affected by the 2019 federal budget.
