INTERNAL CONTROLS

The same comment also appeared in prior Report B50324.

There was a lack of segregation of duties within the internal control system of the Clerk of the Circuit Court (Clerk) related to financial transactions. The Clerk had not separated incompatible activities related to cash and investments, receipts, and disbursements.

Cash and Investments

The individual with responsibilities for receipting and disbursing funds also performed the monthly bank reconciliations. There was no indication of a review, oversight, or approval process.

Receipts

The Clerk's office had one cash drawer which was utilized by six employees, with one employee responsible for reconciling the daily receipts to the drawer. There was no indication of a review, oversight, or approval process.

Disbursements

Individuals with responsibility for disbursing funds had complete control over the disbursements function. The same individuals responsible for preparation of checks also used the Clerk's signature stamp to sign those checks authorizing payment. There was no indication of a review, oversight, or approval process.

The Indiana State Board of Accounts (SBOA) is required under Indiana Code 5-11-1-27(e) to define the acceptable minimum level of internal control standards. To provide clarifying guidance, the State Examiner compiled the standards contained in the manual, *Uniform Internal Control Standards for Indiana Political Subdivisions*. All political subdivisions subject to audit by SBOA are expected to adhere to these standards. The standards include adequate control activities. According to this manual:

"Control activities are the actions and tools established through policies and procedures that help to detect, prevent, or reduce the identified risks that interfere with the achievement of objectives. Detection activities are designed to identify unfavorable events in a timely manner whereas prevention activities are designed to deter the occurrence of an unfavorable event. Examples of these activities include reconciliations, authorizations, approval processes, performance reviews, and verification processes.

An integral part of the control activity component is segregation of duties. . . .

There is an expectation of segregation of duties. If compensating controls are necessary documentation should exist to identify both the areas where segregation of duties are not feasible or practical and the compensating controls implemented to mitigate the risk. . . ."
