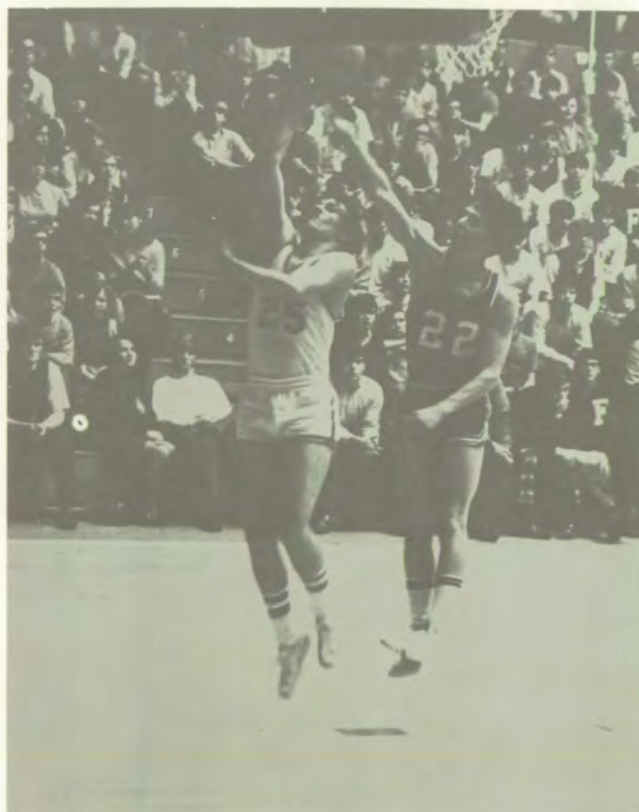

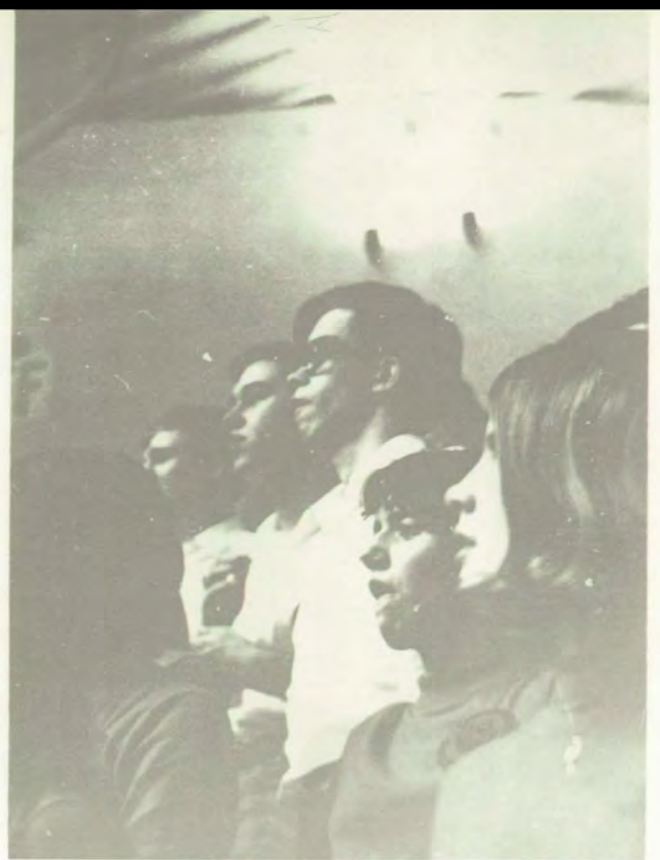
Pep Club traveled with them to several away games and sectional was no exception. It would be nice to see the spirit at the end of the season this year as good at the begining of next year.

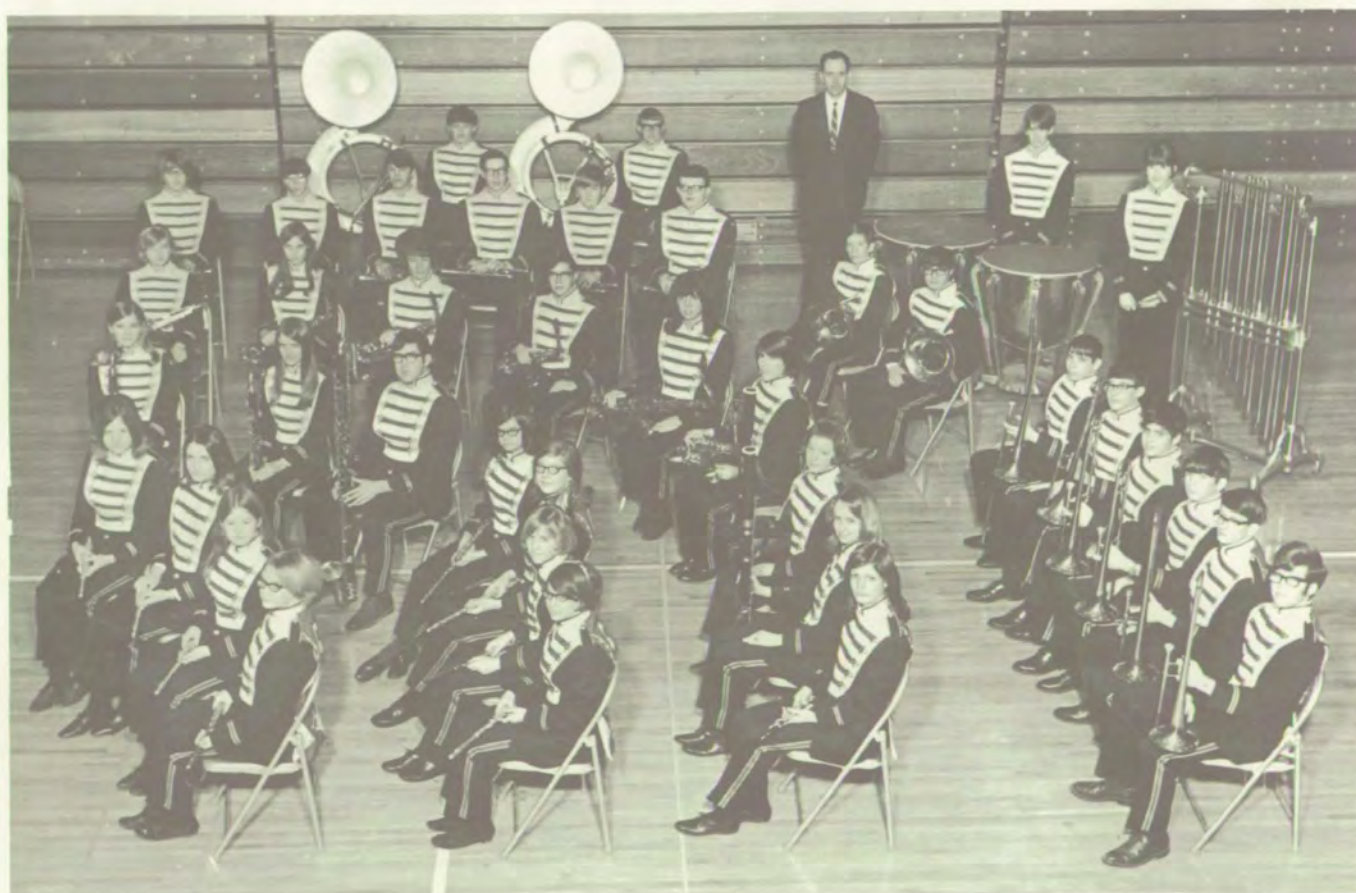

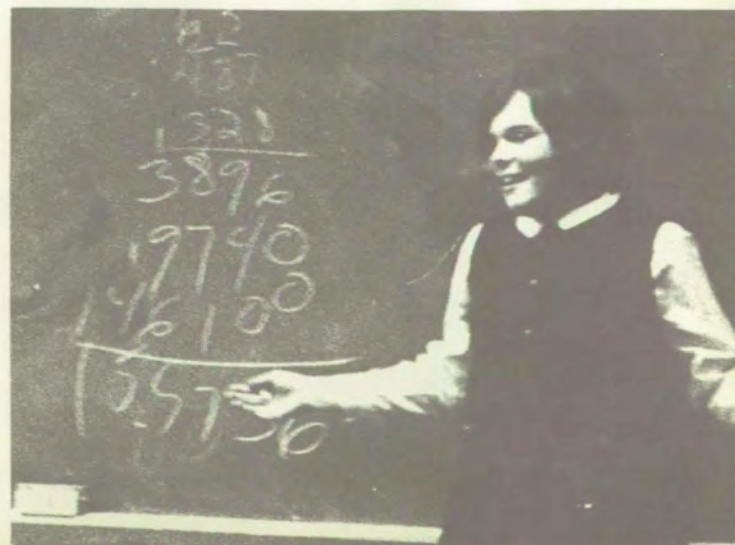

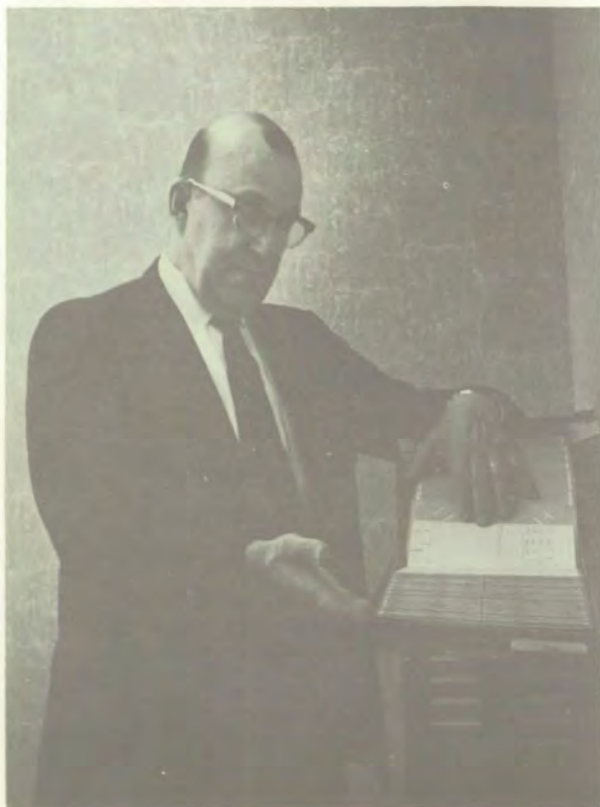

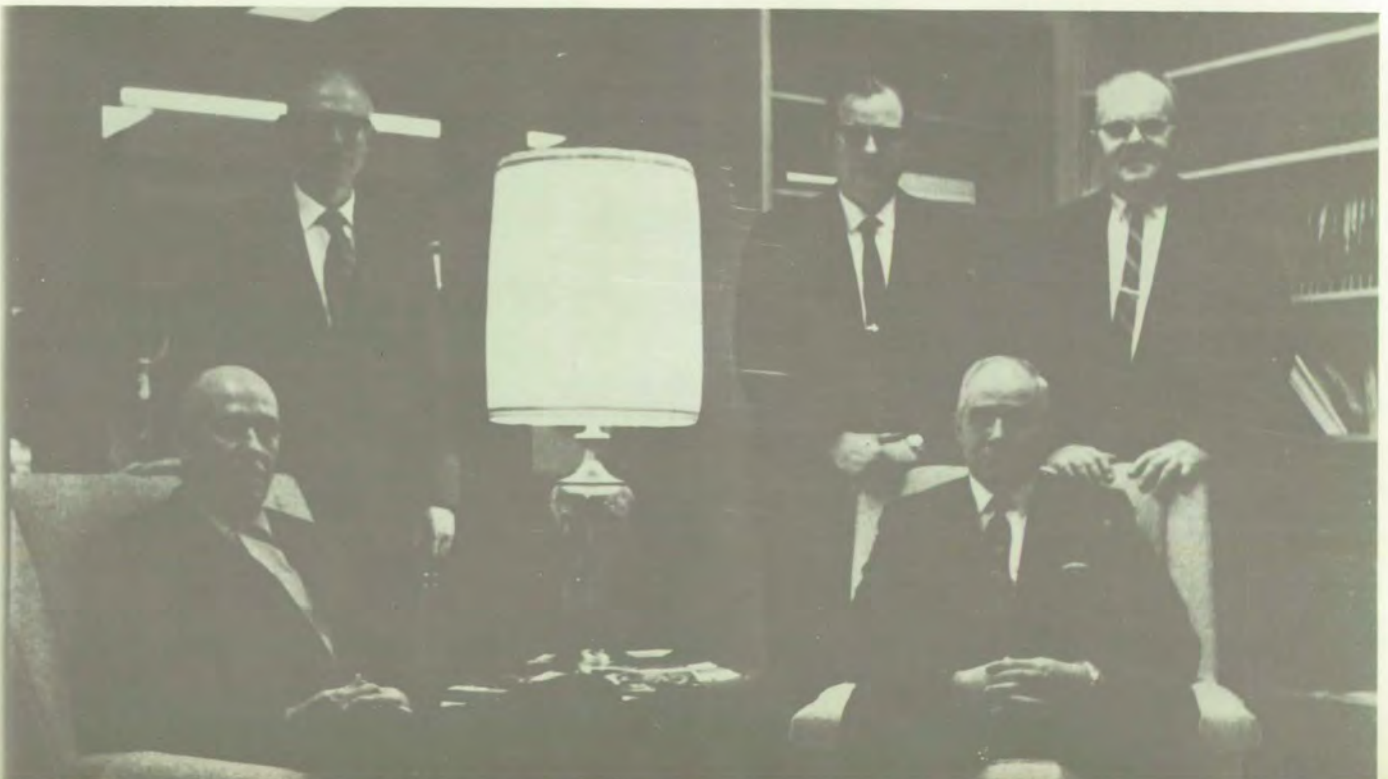
