Your State of Indiana dental plan includes additional care during pregnancy

Pregnancy is an exciting time. You're probably busy with doctor appointments and readying the baby's room. It makes sense if dental cleanings fell to the bottom of your to-do list, but good dental health can help you avoid problems during pregnancy.

That's why your dental plan offers more protection. If you have a qualifying medical condition, such as a pregnancy can get extra dental care — including more cleanings and routine exams.¹ These extra services are 100% covered when you see a dentist in your plan's network. They also won't count against your plan's yearly coverage maximum.

How extra dental care works

If you're pregnant or have any of these conditions:

- Cancer treated with chemotherapy
- Diabetes
- Head or neck cancer treated with chemotherapy or radiation
- HIV or AIDS
- End-stage kidney disease
- Organ or bone marrow transplant
- Stroke

You can get these services more often¹

- Cleanings
- · Gum maintenance
- Fluoride
- Sealants
- Gum scaling and root planing (also known as deep cleaning)
- Routine or problem-focused exams
